IPPA rolls out apprentice program on some junior college campuses

EAST PEORIA, Ill. – Representatives of the Illinois Pork Producers Association (IPPA) are making the rounds of Illinois junior colleges to promote their new livestock apprenticeship program. The program, which was registered with the Department of Labor through the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, will prepare career seekers to succeed in the role of swine animal care technician. The goal of the program is to encourage students to choose a career in the livestock industry while attending college and advancing their goals.

According to Jackie Wibel, IPPA director of content creation and community relations, participating apprentices will receive competitive compensation that will increase as they progress through the program. Apprentices will also receive a debtfree education and livestock certificate from one of five participating community colleges. Wibel was on hand to offer information about the program during a September tech-curriculum showcase at one of the participating schools, Illinois Central College in East Peoria, where over 400 area high school juniors and seniors were in attendance.

"This new program is a two-year program where we pair you with a pork producer in your area. In exchange for you working with them, the farmer would pay your tuition," Wibel explained to a student who approached Wibel to learn about the program, and the pork industry in general. "Each school has its own curriculum criteria, so we supply links to these school's contacts on our website so students

can find which courses they will be required to take."

Colleges participating in the IPPA apprenticeship program along with ICC are John Wood Community College, Quincy; Kaskaskia Community College, Centralia; Lake Land Community College, Mattoon, and Lincoln Land Community College, Springfield. While ICC's apprenticeship program will not begin until the fall of 2026, a couple of the participating colleges will roll out their program opportunities in spring 2026.

"We decided to create this program to address one specific need," Wibel told Farm World. "We need more people to go back to the farm and work. We are having labor issues on pretty much any kind of farm, not just the big farms. I think it's more of the smaller farms that need more people to come back and work for them, and we hope this program can kind of incentivize that."

In these tough financial times for many families, the offer of a free twoyear certificate program combined with real-world work experience could nudge those who hadn't considered a career in agriculture toward the industry, Wibel added.

"They are going to graduate with a certificate and be debt-free," she said.

No sponsoring farm families have yet been selected for the apprentice-ship at ICC, which is in Tazewell County in central Illinois. Once a student declares their interest in the program for the 2026 fall semester, Wibel will reach out to interested producers and connect them with the apprentice.

The five community colleges were initially selected to participate because they have strong agriculturally based programs and geographically represent a large portion of the swine production in the state, according to Jennifer Tirey, IPPA executive director. "When I contacted each of the community colleges to gauge interest they were all very excited to participate and work alongside our association to increase job creation within the pork industry," she stated.

The program was established with assistance from Apprenticeship Illinois, an online concierge service that helps businesses create registered apprenticeship programs. IPPA will work with the five participating colleges and the state's network of localized Apprenticeship Specialists to promote

Dairy heifer replacements at 20-year low; could fall further

GREENWOOD VILLAGE, Colo. – A new report by CoBank shows the number of replacement heifers available to enter the dairy herd as milk-producing cows has already fallen to a 20-year low – and based on the research, could fall even further over the next two years before a recovery begins in 2027.

"These declining heifer inventories could limit growth in the milk supply, a looming concern for dairy processors with expansion plans underway," the report said. "The U.S. is currently experiencing a historic \$10 billion investment in new dairy processing facilities expected to come online through 2027.

"The decline in dairy heifers over the last several years is closely tied to beef and dairy market dynamics," the report added. "Tight cattle supplies and record high prices for beef calves prompted many dairy farmers to produce more calves destined for beef feedlots and fewer to milk barns."

Andrew P. Griffith, University of Tennessee professor of agricultural and resource economics, told Farm World, there are several reasons for the lower quantity of replacement heifers in the dairy industry, but the main reason is due to the high value of beef x dairy steers (when a dairy cow is bred to a beef bull to produce a half-beef/half-dairy calf).

He said when the trend of breeding beef and dairy steers started, milk prices were slightly depressed, and there was a demand for more cattle to be placed on feed.

"It became clear very early on that cattle buyers were willing to pay a premium for beef x dairy steers, compared to full-blooded dairy steers," he said. "Thus, the cross calves became a profit center for dairy operations and were more valuable than developing more heifers to place in the milking herd.

"This same occurrence has helped push milk prices higher, which makes it worthwhile to breed cows for heifers, and put the dollars into heifer development. These operations still have to have a mature female to produce the beef x dairy steers."

Corey Geiger, CoBank lead dairy economist, told Farm World since roughly 90 percent of U.S. dairy cows are bred via artificial insemination, "we can predict the future based on semen sales.

"These market shifts began with the low prices for dairy replacements and purebred dairy bull calves," he said. "Our research first evaluated the financial factors that led to the beef-on-dairy movement. That caused dairy farmers to pivot and use beef bull semen on a portion of their dairy cows."

By 2024, he said, 7.9 million of the 9.7 million of beef bull semen units sold in the U.S. were purchased by dairy farmers: "However, the market pendulum swung too far when dairy farmers capitalized on record beef prices. As a result, dairy replacement tumbled to a 20-year low."

He said there are three types of bull semen sold to dairy farmers: 1) conventional dairy semen that results in 50 percent heifer calves and 50 percent bull calves; 2) gender-sorted dairy bull semen that results in

over 90 percent heifer calves; and 3) beef semen.

From 2000 to 2024, he said gender-sorted dairy semen sales climbed by 43.5 percent as dairy farmers began planning their future dairy replacements.

"Likewise, beef semen sold to dairy farmers jumped 58 percent as dairy farmers made beef-on-dairy crosses to capitalize on record beef prices," he said. "The conventional dairy semen category tumbled 46.5 percent as dairy farmers wanted more assurance about their market and financial future.

"Lastly, it wasn't until 2024 that dairy farmers fully came to appreciate just how few dairy replacements were out there," he added. "That's when they ramped up purchases of gender-sorted dairy bull semen."

He said dairy replacements available to enter the milking string will fall further by an estimated 357,500 in 2025, and drop further by an estimated 438,800 in 2026: "It's not until 2027 that the rebound begins with 285,400 more head entering milk barns. Until then, we are likely to see record prices hold."

Based on CoBank's predictive modeling, the report said heifer inventories will shrink by an estimated 800,000 head over the next two years before beginning to rebound in 2027.

In the meantime, Geiger said, dairy heifer prices have reached record highs, and could climb well above \$3,000 per head.

"The U.S. dairy industry stands at a unique inflection point," he said. "Beef sales are contributing a larger share of dairy farm profitability with each passing year and the market for beef-on-dairy calves shows no signs of slowing down.

"In order to maintain sufficient dairy cow numbers and milk production in the near term, dairy farmers will need to put the brakes on dairy cow culling," he added. "And that could be difficult, given how much they've already pulled back over the past two years."

As the supply of dairy heifers has dwindled and their value has climbed, the report said dairy farmers are culling fewer cows to keep the milk flowing.

"They have also made significant changes in semen purchases to help remedy the shortage of replacement heifers by purchasing more gender-sorted units to create more dairy heifer calves," the report said. "But rebuilding the supply will take time. It typically takes two years before a newborn dairy heifer calf is available to enter the milking herd."

Geiger said the decline in heifer inventories raises the question of whether there will be enough milk cows to supply the additional demand created by new dairy processing facilities.

"The short answer is that it will be tight," he said. "Those dairy plants will require more annual milk and component production, largely butterfat and protein. And it will take many more dairy heifer calves in future years to bring the national herd back to historic levels."

Still work to be done to protect labeling in MAHA strategy report

DECATUR, Ill. - Along with their partners, the Modern Ag Alliance (MAA) works with federal and state policymakers to advance legislative solutions that ensure consistency in pesticide labeling and continued innovation in farming. The Alliance, which is part of a consortium of stakeholder partners with primary support from Bayer Crop Sciences, promotes the importance of science-based regulation and the need to reinforce that any pesticide registered with the EPA — and sold under a label consistent with the EPA's own determinations — is sufficient to satisfy health and safety warning requirements.

Elizabeth Burns-Thompson, executive director of the MAA, said in an interview with Farm World that after careful consideration and analysis, she feels there are still issues of concern remaining for agriculture within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) updated "Make America Healthy Again" (MAHA) Strategy Report, which was released on Sept. 9. While the final MAHA report largely backtracked on an earlier version's assertion that commonly-used crop protection tools are unsafe for humans, concerns could remain around the future of glyphosate and other chemicals used on farms.

We are grateful that the voice of the American farmer was indeed heard in the drafting of the final MAHA report," Burns-Thompson said. "However, points of concern do remain. There may still be doors open to changes that do not take into account the true gold standard that we have in this country with the review and analysis that goes into ensuring that the products put on the market are safe. What I would point to is a piece that talks about reforms to the review processes, specifically processes around cumulative effects. We would argue that those are aspects already incorporated into the review process that EPA does, and it is not just a one-anddone process."

In addition, Burns-Thompson and the MAA are wary of ambiguous language in the final MAHA report that could lead to confusion when states seek to implement the report's recommendations. "This calendar year some states put

forward initially some concerning legislation that would have changed how food product labeling looks in relation to pesticides, specifically. Texas and, I believe, Louisiana incorporated glyphosate and atrazine in those initial conversations but that was ultimately stripped out as it went through the legislature," she said

"I believe what happens in D.C. is very important as we are looking ahead to 2026. We need to have robust conversations with our state lawmakers looking at how they take MAHA-related policies and implement them at the state level. At the end of the day the underlying goal of MAHA, making us all healthier, is something everybody can get on board with. Some of the tactics or approaches being used are where we need to have some of these conversations."

Burns-Thompson engaged with dozens of farmers who filed by MAA's booth in the Varied Industries Tent over the three-day course of the recent 2025 Farm Progress Show in Decatur. Many of the farmers Burns-Thompson spoke to at the 2025 FPS voiced concern about the disconnect between those who are actively involved in farming and the general public regarding how food is produced

"We need to be working to bridge that gap in explaining what we do, how we do it and why we do it, especially when it comes to crop protection tools and these critical chemistries that we depend on," she said. "Everybody appreciates the affordability, abundance and safety of our food and fuel supply, and there is a growing opportunity to talk about what is necessary to (achieve) that process."

According to the Alliance, glyphosate is the backbone of modern farming. The most widely used herbicide in the U.S. for the past 50 years, glyphosate is regarded as a cost-effective tool that can be used safely when applied as directed. Protecting farmers' access to this critical crop protection tool is a top priority of the MAA.

"Farmers are telling us that if we lose glyphosate to this process or these challenges via the legal system or regulatory systems, they are very concerned that it will create a bellwether effect for every other active ingredient in every tool in their toolbox. This was actually one of the biggest concerns of the farm-

ers I spoke to at Farm Progress," said Burns-Thompson. "Every aspect of ag has some type of pest management that needs to take place."

A lack of clarity and consistency around pesticide labels could create a tumbling effect that could begin "tearing tools out of the toolbox" of farmers moving forward, she added. For that reason and others, MAA has conducted state-level legislative conversations in around 12 states in 2025 that were "laser-focused" on labeling certainty and clarity.

"The legislation looked almost identical in every state, and I'm very pleased we got (bills) over the finish line in North Dakota and Georgia. In the interim, since most legislative bodies have concluded at the state level for fall, we have shifted our focus into the federal space. There is language that sits within the House Interior Appropriations Bill Section 453 that would provide consistency and clarity around pesticide labeling at the federal level. It is also a topic that continues to be talked about as part of the 'Skinny Farm Bill' or 'Farm Bill 2.0," Burns-Thompson said.



USDA predicts record high corn crop for the United States

The corn side of U.S. balance and a slim 9 mbu were added sheets saw a 20 million bu increase to old crop ending stocks in the September update, putting it at 1.325 billion bu. The most attention was on new crop production though, where the USDA trimmed the average U.S. corn yield but bumped harvested acres even higher. The U.S. corn yield is now estimated at 186.7 bushels per acre, 2 less than in August, but a 7.4 bushel increase from last year.

Harvested acres increased to 90 million, up from last month's 88.7 million. This added 73 mbu to the U.S. crop, taking it to 16.814 bbu, a 13 percent increase from last year and the largest U.S. crop on record. The only change in new crop demand was a 100 mbu increase to exports. This put new crop carryout at 2.11 bbu, a 7 mbu decline from last month. This is a 13 percent stocks to use and indicates a cash value of \$3.90 per bushel.

No major changes were made to old crop soybean balance sheets this month, holding carryout at 330 mbu. As with corn, all interest fell on new crop balance sheets. The USDA also found another 200,000 sovbean acres this month, but yield held steady at 53.5 bushels per acre,

to the U.S. crop. This put production at 4.3 bbu, 66 mbu fewer than last year's crop. Soybean crush was bumped up 15 mbu and seed was up 3 mbu, but this was negated by a 20 mbu cut to forecast exports. New crop carryout is now projected at an even 300 mbu. cash value of soybeans is now \$10 per bushel.

The only change to domestic wheat balance sheets this month was a 25 mbu increase in exports. This lowered projected ending stocks an equal amount, taking them to 844 mbu. This is a 41.1 percent stocks to use and equates to a \$5.10 per bushel cash value.

On the global side, few changes were made to 2024/25 carryout estimates. Global corn carryout is now estimated at 284.18 million metric tons, up from last month's 283.11 mmt. World soybean carryout is pegged at 123.58 mmt, below the August estimate of 125.19 mmt. Global wheat ending stocks are projected at 262.42 mmt, little changed from last month's 262.70 mmt.

The world carryout numbers for the 2025/26 marketing year were a little more changed. Corn carryout for this marketing year is now estimated at 281.40 mmt, 1.1 mmt less than last month's estimate.

> The world soybean carryout is estimated at 123.99 mmt, 1 mmt less than the August number. Global wheat carryover for this year is estimated at 264.06 mmt, a yearto-year increase of 4 mmt.

Notable changes in global crops this month were a 3 mmt increase to Brazil's 24/25 corn crop and a 3.5 mmt increase to this year's Australian wheat crop.

Only minimal changes were made to beef and pork balance sheets this month. Beef production for 2025 was cut 100 million pounds to a total of 25.83 billion pounds. Beef production for 2026 increased by 20 million pounds, putting it at 25.49 billion pounds. Beef exports are forecast at 2.64 billion pounds for this year and 2.53 billion pounds from next year, declines of 40 million pounds and 20 million pounds, respectively. Beef imports were bumped up 90 million pounds for 2025 to 5.36 billion and left unchanged at 4.95 bil-

lion pounds for 2026. Average steer value projections are now \$228.56 per hundredweight for this year and \$248.50 for next year.

U.S. pork production was cut 180 million pounds this year to 27.57 billion pounds and left unchanged for 2026 at 28.38 billion pounds. Pork exports saw no changes this month, leaving them at 6.98 billion pounds for 2025 and 7 billion pounds for 2026. Average hog values are now estimated at \$69.82 per cwt for this year and \$66.00 per cwt for 2026.

The Brazilian analytical firm CON-AB has released its final 2024/25 grain and soybean crop numbers. CONAB put Brazil's 24/25 soybean crop at 171.47 million mt, up from the previous 169.65 mmt. Brazil's soybean exports were increased by 400,000 mt to total 106.65 mmt, and ending stocks jumped from 3.9 mmt to 10.3 mmt. On corn, the crop was raised from last month's 137 mmt to a final number of 139.67 mmt. CON-AB held Brazil's corn exports to 40 mmt though as domestic demand will consume much of the larger crop. Corn carryout is still expected to increase 12.81 mmt from the group's prior 10.26 mmt estimate. CONAB is putting Brazil's wheat crop at 7.54 mmt, down from the previous 7.81

the program.

"After connecting with Apprenticeship Illinois, they assisted us through the entire registration process. We worked with the five community colleges to ensure they had the high-quality curriculum our producers were looking for, and less than six months later we are proud to be rolling out the first livestock focused apprenticeship program in Illinois," Tirey said.

According to an IPPA news release, pork producers interested in hosting an apprentice must sign an agreement with the students to offset their tuition costs in exchange for workforce training. Tuition costs taken on by the participating producers will be offset by the Apprenticeship Illinois Tax Credit, which allows employers up to \$5,000 per apprentice per year in reimbursement for training costs. Students will be expected to work on-farm and complete the job competencies outlined in the job position to receive their certificate at the end of the two years.

According to company officials, the Tipton location is one of 2,000 Nutrien Ag Solutions retail facilities across North America – with the majority of these operating as farm centers and smaller satellite locations – included in the company's capital improvement initiative, designed to modernize operations and enhance service in regions experiencing rapid agricultural growth.

Company officials added the ribbon-cutting ceremony marked a milestone for Tipton, bringing together Nutrien employees, local farmers, suppliers, and community leaders to celebrate this new era for the site, with guests touring the upgraded facility.

"The mission of this new facility is to support the success of farmers in central Indiana," company officials told Farm World in a Sept. 17 statement. "This facility meets our team's goals of safety – improved facilities with a focus on operational flow and safety processes, and proven accuracy in crop protection and nutrition products, and speed, convenience, value and increased serviceable acres."

"For our team, it's not just new infrastructure; it's a commitment to our farmers that Nutrien will be here, season after season," Clayton said.



A commodity that is quickly becoming undervalued is soy oil. Soy oil futures have eroded 12 percent in the past five weeks as they try to compete with cheaper vegetable oils in the global market. The main one of these is palm oil which has at times been 50 percent the value of soy oil. This drop in soy oil comes at the same time, U.S. reserves have fallen to a seven-month low. It is also right ahead of an increase in biodiesel mandates that take effect on Jan. 1 and are expected to raise demand by 67 percent. This will only elevate soy oil demand with a crush industry already running at full capacity.

Missouri Direct Hay Report

Direct Hay Weighted Average Report for week ending 9/19/2025

Scattered rains fell in various areas of the state over the last few days, locations and amounts varied greatly, with nothing widespread enough to change the current situation of dryness. Drought conditions have continued to worsen as heat came back into the picture and moisture has not been a thing for most. As of the latest Drought Monitor near 98 percent of the state is in some form of drought now with the entirety of the Boothill in D3 or Extreme status and just over 30 percent listed as D2 or Severe. Hay feeding or supplementing of some kind has become fairly common in the southern half of the state. Luckly before rains quit in early Aug grass had been abundant, and producers baled a lot of hay early. Without some fall rains soon though it could make for an incredibly long feeding season as first frost date isn't all that far away. Hay movement has been slow to moderate there has been an uptick but with many baling a lot of hay and having supplies on hand it hasn't anything extreme at this point and there is currently a lot of hay offered for sale without having to travel very far regardless of where in the state one might be. Hay prices are steady to firm, supplies are moderate to heavy, and demand is light to moderate. Farm equipment time capsule wows bidders at Jeff Boston auction

CARLISLE, Ind. - During the last week of August, Jeff Boston Auction Service hosted an online sale for the Robbins estate, featuring an impressive mix of classic tractors, primitives and early farm gear. The auctioneer described the sale as a step back in time, praising the Robbins family as excellent stewards of farm history who worked hard to preserve the legacy of the American farmer. A total of 412 lots were offered, including classic agricultural equipment, horse-drawn implements, antique wagons and parts, early tools, farm signs, older trucks, and a selection of modern machinery and shop tools.

Though the sale was rooted in time-honored equipment, the top seller was a more modern piece. A 2008 CIH/Farmall 45 with only 387 hours brought \$16,500. It was offered a 45-hp four-cylinder diesel, dual entry doors, MFWD, Hydrodrive, a category 1 fast hitch, 540 PTO, one SCV, and 17.5L-24 industrial tread rubber. Close behind, a mid-1980s New Holland T1510 MFWD compact utility tractor showing just 930 hours went for \$14,400. It featured a 30-hp diesel, 3-speed transmission, joystick control, category 1 hitch, 540 PTO, rollbar, New Holland 110TL quick-attach loader, 5-foot quick-attach bucket, and 15 x 19.5 industrial tread rubber.

With the modern tractors sold, attention quickly turned back to the vintage lineup. A 1953 Oliver 88 row crop edition, in running condition, commanded \$4,550. This wide-front model included a belt pulley, hydraulics, PTO, one pair of rear wheel weights, and well-maintained 14.9-38 tires. Another Oliver - a 1948 Oliver 70 wide-front row crop machine - made it to \$2,800. Also running, it carried a belt pulley, PTO and 13.6-

Other vintage tractors included an operating 1941 Oliver-built Cockshutt 60 with steel rear wheels that drew \$2,300, and a 1946 Farmall H, also running, with a PTO, rear wheel weights, and 11.2-38 tires, which fetched \$2,150. A non-running 1940s Minneapolis-Moline RTN with a PTO and good 11.2-36 rubber struck \$1,150. Several 1940s Allis-Chalmers models also drew bids in the hundreds, including a working 1942 AC "WC" featuring a belt pulley, wheel weights, new front tires, and 12.4R34 rears that struck \$575. A non-operating WD45 landed \$470, while a similar-condition 1947 AC WC with rear spoke wheels and 14.9-24 fronts was carted off for \$410.

As the event moved on to antique

wagons, attention shifted to an antique IHC Weber work wagon. This piece, sporting its original springboard seat and its tongue modified for a tractor hitch, commanded a strong \$3,450. A John Deere Triumph flare bed wagon, boasting steel wheels and old paint and stenciling, bid to \$1,100. Meanwhile, a steelwheel work wagon of unknown make found a new owner at \$525.

Horse-drawn implements also attracted spirited bidding, though the prices remained more modest. A lefthand Oliver wooden beam plow hammered down at \$400, while an Oliver 'Superior" 12-hole wooden grain drill, bearing wooden spoke wheels and a seed attachment, went for \$340. A 7-foot horse-drawn hay tedder on steel wheels reached \$210, and a primitive wooden planter, still wearing its faded red paint and stencil markings, was grabbed for a mere \$55.

The auction also carried vintage machine-pulled implements, including a compact 1940s Oliver "Superior" ground-driven manure spreader that reached \$775. Two Oliver pulltype plows - a model 7673 equipped with 3-14s; another with 4-14s - each sold for \$400. In contrast, an Oliver 9-foot wheel disc changed hands for only \$175.

From horse-drawn to mechanized equipment, the sale held a wide selection of parts. A pair of IHC cleated iron wheels measuring 52 ½ inches in diameter rolled away for \$280. Meanwhile, bidding on a springboard buggy seat struck \$115. An unidentified Farmall front grill went for \$80, while the bones of an Oliver 70 were snapped up for just \$77.50.

Things rolled on with a lineup of older vehicles, highlighted by a 1985 Chevy Custom Deluxe 10 pickup that pushed to \$2,000. Described as a

genuine "barn find," the single-owner truck had been parked for about 15 years. It held a 305 V-8, automatic transmission, 2WD, and a long bed sans a tailgate. Despite its weathered exterior, the odometer showed just 1,850. Later, two single-axle Chevy grain trucks crossed the block at matching \$1,700 bids. The first was a 1985 Chevy 70 also stored for years, but nicely equipped with a V8, 14foot bed, hoist, and good-condition 10R-22.5 tires. The other was a 1967 Chevy 50 featuring a small block V8, 16-foot bed, hoist, and 9.00-20 tires.

Roughly two dozen agricultural signs and related advertising pieces crossed the block, drawing solid interest. Topping the category was a 66-by-28-inch metal Garst sign. Despite being worn, it still managed to bring in \$110. An early two-gallon Standard Oil "Wagon Axle Grease" bucket - complete with its lid and even some remaining contents - was claimed for \$85. A 24-by-10-inch lighted Baxter's advertising sign followed at \$72.50, while a 24-by-18inch metal Voris Seed sign found a new home for just \$45.

A few other attention-getters helped round out the sale. Among those was a Jack Robbins novelty tractor based on International parts, snagged for \$155. Another creative piece by Robbins - a home bar made from an Oliver 70 hood topped by a 4-by-2-foot, half-inch thick glass top - hit \$140, and a shop seat fashioned from an IH tractor seat mounted on a steel wheel made it to \$110. These unique finds added a memorable finish to a lively auction.

Trees for towns and communities

Grants totaling \$508,559 are available to fund community and urban forestry projects throughout Indiana. There are three separate grant opportunities available.

All three have the same application deadline of Oct. 23, 2025; however, each grant has different parameters, funding levels

and project types.

Please read the application instructions for each carefully because grant eligibility and the application processes have changed. You may apply for more than one grant, but receiving funding for more than one grant is not guaranteed. Funding announcements will be made by Nov. 17, 2025.

The grant opportunities are now open for applying. All applications will be submitted on the State Budget Agency (SBA) website at: https://www.in.gov/sba/grants/state-agency-grant-opportunities/.

Community & Urban Forestry Assistance (CUFA) grant where projects may include inventories, management plans and tree plantings.

State Urban Forest Resilience (SUFR) grant with funding for managing and recovery from emerald ash borer. Projects may include removal of dead ash trees, treatment of ash trees and tree plantings.

Small Town Big Trees where only communities with a population of 10,000 or less are eligible for the grant. Projects may include inventories, management plans and tree plantings.

LARE Grants

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources announced organizations in 12 Indiana counties will receive \$1,324,000 in grants to fund 18 different lake, river, and watershed land treatment projects through DNR's Lake and

River Enhancement (LARE) program.

The projects are in LaGrange, Mont-

gomery, Kosciusko, Owen, Marion, Elkhart, Starke, Dekalb, Randolph, Fountain, Jennings and Gibson counties.

The grants are funded through the LARE fee paid annually by boat owners when they register their craft with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles. The user-funded program benefits boaters all over the state. The grants allow for the completion of projects too difficult for lo-

cal organizations to fund on their own. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis, and local sponsors share at least 20 percent of the cost.

This round of grant-funded projects will benefit eight lakes and 11 rivers and streams, with some projects benefiting more than one lake. In addition, two land-based projects associated with watershed land treatment practices have been funded in coordination with local Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Many of the projects aim to improve water quality by reducing sediment and nutrient inputs. Improved water quality helps fish and wildlife populations and improves recreational opportunities.

The projects, listed by body of water, county, project type, and grant award, can be found at lare.dnr.IN.gov.

Body of Ligonier man recovered

Indiana Conservation Officers were investigating after recovering the body of a Ligonier man from Engle Lake in Noble County earlier in September.

At 8:50 a.m., officers were notified of a missing person, 47-year-old Michael W. Vinson, of Ligonier, who had not returned home from a fishing trip to the lake.

Officers on scene found a kayak, paddle, and fishing equipment floating in the water. Officers located Vinson's body using a side-scan sonar.

At 4 p.m., Department of Natural Resources Law Enforcement divers recovered Vinson's body in 25 feet of water.

Indiana Conservation Officers remind the public to always wear a life jacket when on or around the water.



Madisonville North Hopkins High School, of Madison County, came out on top in this inaugural event and was honored at this year's state fair.


The competition was the kickoff event for this fall's All in for Ag Education Week (Sept. 15-19).

Most of the ingredients came from produce the students grew in their school garden this summer with some supplemental products from local producers or produce that don't grow well in Kentucky. After judges from the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service reviewed recipes based on food safety, prep guidelines, and the basic knowledge students demonstrated about making the salsa, Shell, Lt. Governor Jacqueline Coleman, and Education Commissioner Robbie Fletcher made the final selections.

have learned responsibility, patience and teamwork. Even when we had rabbits and insects eat our plants or even take up our gardens, we found solutions and didn't give up."

Students at Menifee County Middle School grew green peppers, onions, tomatoes and cilantro for their salsa recipe. They tended to 10 raised bed gardens each day since April, adding fertilizer, weeding and fending off

Their recipe (Sweatheart Salsa) incorporated pineapple and lime.

"Our salsa and its name represent our community because the borders of Menifee County are shaped like a heart," Menifee member Garrett Lane said. "When we were planning our recipe, we wanted something colorful, healthy, and a little bit sweet, just like our community.'

Menifee team member Shelby Cornett said, "I would describe our salsa as similar to pico de gallo. Versatility was important for us in making our recipe as it could be put on a variety of dishes, such as hot dogs, salads and pork chops.'

Cornett said the Salsa Challenge was a fun experience and she hopes to keep learning about agriculture.

"There's always more to learn in agriculture, I don't think anybody could ever get bored of it," she said. "I think it's a very valuable skill."

During the salsa demonstration, the students chopped ingredients, added them to a bowl and mixed them. They put the finished product in sample cups with chips for audience members to try.

Bethany Mattingly, division director of Agriculture Education and Outreach at KDA, said the department started this challenge because they wanted to showcase what schools are doing to teach agriculture.

"We want to keep teaching Kentucky's educational standards, but we want to do it through the lens of agriculture, and we're doing that because it's highly engaging," Mattingly said. "When making their salsa the kids are using a tons of different things that they learned in school, whether that's measuring. doing math, being able to talk, prepare a written instruction, follow that instruction, all of those things are standards that we're trying to hit."

Mattingly said more schools had intentions of getting involved in the salsa challenge, but weather-related issues during this year's growing season hindered many of those gardens.

The winning recipe: Kernel & Comb

- · 4 ears fresh sweet corn (or 3 cups frozen, thawed)
- · 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- · 1 red bell pepper, diced
- · ½ small red onion, finely diced · 1-2 jalapenos, seeded & finely
- · 2 medium Roma tomatoes, diced
- · fresh cilantro, chopped
- · 2 Tbsp honey · 2 Tbsp lime juice
- · ½ tsp smoked paprika
- · ½ tsp cumin
- · 1 ½ tsp salt

· ¼ tsp black pepper

Cut kernels off cob. Roast corn on high heat for 8-10 minutes, stirring until charred. Combine corn, bell pepper, onion, jalapenos, tomatoes and cilantro in a bowl. Stir in honey, lime juice, spices, salt and pepper. Mix well. Serve warm or chill for 30 minutes before serving.

into bringing what might be a record of 263 1206 tractors to the 2025 Half Century show. They were celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Farmall 1206 model.

Friends of Green, that help support the Half Century of Progress as well as Historic Days at Penfield, Ill., organized the 60th anniversary of the John Deere 4020 tractors. Ed Winkleman and Chris Elliott were the organizers for the 4020 Gathering. "The 4020 was probably the most popular tractor John Deere ever built in the New Generation," Winkleman shared. The 4020 came in gas, diesel, LP, and powershift.

"Deere needed to refine things," Elliott said. "That is a unique thing from Deere. They refine their products."

Ohio couple helps to encourage 4-H members' love of horses, other animals

HAMILTON, Ohio - Dust swirls around the arena where kids are riding their horses - pleasure riding, pole bending or whatever. Parents watch from the stands. All of this swirls around Tracey and Chad Ingle, who supervise the facility and encourage the kids in whatever they are doing, primarily 4-H.

"We do a little bit of everything," Tracev Ingle said. "We work mainly with our 4-H kids. Our club is Young Riders Etc. We had to add "Etc." because we're not just a horse club anymore. We are a multi-animal club. So many people wanted to come into our club, and we now show everything from rabbits, turkeys, chickens, pigs, any kind of livestock, all the way up to horses."

The Ingles own 18 horses. Many of them were born there. The couple have trained the horses themselves. However, the stable is also home to one heifer, three goats, and a number of cats. When the club members show pigs, they keep them at the barn, too.

"We lease the horses to them, but we get no money," Tracey said. "You're not supposed to do that when you're a 4-H adviser. You're supposed to be helping the kids, you're not supposed to make money from them. They take care of the horse's shots for fair and their shoes; everything else, the horses are here, they're ours, we take care of them."

The Ingles' two kids, Chloe and Colby, are now adults. They were in 4-H from little on. They showed horses, hogs and

cattle. Tracey rode too, then. But bad phies are proof of that." knees put a stop to that. Besides the fair, the Ingles also take the 4-H kids and the horses to open shows all over.

"We were always on the show circuit with our kids," Tracey said. "It is not something I ever gave up. I like it."

Added Chad: "We enjoy having the kids around, they keep us young. They keep us on the move. We just enjoy kids, and they appreciate what we're doing. I have said it a million times. 4-H is a wonderful program, and I think it helps kids who are either headed the wrong way, or who could possibly head the wrong way, to keep their lives straight. We don't have that here. All of these kids are good kids; they always bond together. These kids become part of our family."

Tracey added that they have a lot of kids now, and she hopes that when she dies, each one of them has something positive to say, that she gave them opportunities they would not have had.

"We do give kids opportunities," Tracey said. "A lot of people can't afford horses. They are a very expensive hobby. If it means helping kids out, then I will help them. It is giving them something that our kids had and appreciated, and I think it made them better people. It's the responsibility, the commitment, the relationship with the animal is unbelievable. That's not just with horses, that's with any animal. Their ribbons and tro-

"It means a lot that they help me get to the fair," she said. "I love horses."

Carrie Judd, McKenna's mom, said that Tracey helped McKenna switch from riding English to contesting. Two of Carrie's nieces also ride there now. When Carrie was inquiring about an equine 4-H club, everyone suggested the Ingles' club.

"Tracey and Chad come out here and they drag this arena every night for the kids," Carrie Judd said. "They keep water, popsicles, snacks, everything for the kids out here. Tracey likes to cook, so she'll have meals to eat for everybody while they are watching their kids ride. We have become family. It's been a blessing.'



Spillman Farm among those honored with Hoosier Homestead award

INDIANAPOLIS – According to family lore, when Jane Campbell Martin arrived at the land she bought in Decatur County, Ind., in 1825, there were Native American tipis on the hillside of the property.

Two hundred years - and several generations - later, Martin's descendants still own the same 80 acres she purchased.

"(Jane) was the first settler to own the property in 1825," said Adam Spillman, Martin's fifth great grandson. "She was from Cincinnati, Ohio. We're not sure why she chose this location. I think my ancestors would be proud that the farm is still in the family."

The Spillman family was one of 95 farming families honored Aug. 13 with a Hoosier Homestead Award by the Indiana State Department of Agriculture (ISDA). The Spillman family received a Centennial Award (100 years), Sesquicentennial Award (150 years) and a Bicentennial Award (200 years). The awards were handed out during the Indiana State Fair.

The farm is owned by Adam's father Lonnie, and Lonnie's siblings Harold Spillman and Donna Spillman. The original 80 acres are leased and planted with corn and soybeans.

Adam said his family sought the awards because his grandfather always wanted the farm to be recognized agency said. in that manner.

"At first, it was hard to gather all the information (required for the awards) until we found the original abstract that had been in storage because my family was renovating the house on the property," he explained. "The abstract stated the homestead was purchased in 1825, (but) the deed said 1826 because the closest land survey office was in Brookville, Ind., so it didn't get recorded until 1826. It was signed by President John Quincy Adams."

The original deed was made out of sheepskin and remains in the family's possession, Spillman said.

The oldest building remaining on the homestead is a house built in 1931 by Adam's great grandfather. A Revolutionary War Soldier - John O. Gullion - is buried on the property. Spillman said Gullion wasn't related to his family.

The Hoosier Homestead Award recognizes the commitment of the families to Indiana agriculture, according to ISDA. More than 6,200 families have received the award since the program began in 1976.

To be considered for an award, a farm must be owned by the same family for more than 100 consecutive years and have more than 20 acres, ISDA said. If less than 20 acres, the farm must produce more than \$1,000 of agricultural products annually, the

"I am continually inspired by the long-established farming families that are recognized during the Hoosier Homestead ceremonies," Don Lamb, ISDA director, said in a release. "I personally know the amount of commitment and dedication needed to keep a farm in the family for 100 years or more. I thank each one for their devotion to the agriculture industry and their loyalty to the state of Indiana."

Seven additional Hoosier farms were honored with a Bicentennial Award: Michael B. McConnell family, Gibson County; Chastain family, Montgomery County; Runyan family, Montgomery County; Robert M. Stwalley Jr. family, Montgomery County; Dobson family. Putnam County: Meal family. Rush County; and the Dennis and Sue Briggs family, Switzerland County.

Bill reducing family farm death reporting fees advances in Michigan

LANSING, Mich. - Relief could be on the way from the steep penalties levied on family farms if a work-related death of an immediate family member is late in being reported in Michigan.

The effort to change the current state law was triggered by the 2019 death of a farmer whose family was fined over \$12,000 for failing to report the accident within eight hours as required from all employers by the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

Eight hours would still be the reporting deadline, but the fine would be reduced by 80 percent for first-time violators under the measure passing out of the Michigan House of Representatives on Sept. 3 by a wide margin.

House Bill 4017, sponsored by Rep. Jerry Neyer (R-Shepherd) and supported by Michigan Farm Bureau, was before the Committee on Labor in the State Senate for further consideration.

"We're standing with farmers and their families by making sure that no one grieving the loss of a loved one is harshly punished for simply being human," Neyer said.

Neyer, a dairy farmer and member of the Isabella County branch of farm bureau, said the bill respects the emotional toll of losing a loved one and need for compassion in enforcing workplace safety regulations. He's also chairman of the House Agriculture Committee.

"When a loved one dies unexpectedly on a family farm, the last thing on anyone's mind is paperwork. My plan maintains the need to alert the state of workplace fatalities while recognizing the difficulty of these situations and offering more grace for those who miss the deadline," he said.

Keith Eisenmann, the co-owner of a family farm, died after falling through a roof while making repairs to a barn.

Neyer said the family was "understandably distraught" and was late in filing the paperwork, yet fined over \$12,000 for what he described as a "minor oversight."

The family's appeal was denied.

"My legislation brings common sense to an outdated rule by acknowledging you can't treat family farms the same way you treat huge corporations with massive human resource departments. Our Michigan farms are the heart of our rural communities and they deserve fair, human treatment when facing the unthinkable," he said.

Previous attempts to pass the legislation failed when the measure stalled in the Senate in 2023 and Gov. Gretchen Whitmer vetoed it in 2021.

Whitmer said MIOSHA was already allowed to reduce fines on family farms cooperating with death investigations by up to 90 percent.


She also said the definition of family farm in the bill was inconsistent with federal OSHA policies and could lead to confusion and possible state non-compliance with federal requirements.

MFB Legislative Counsel Josh Scramblin said the deadline plays a critical role in protecting workers but disagrees with the one size fits all employers approach in the current law.

"Timely reporting helps prevent unsafe conditions from being concealed, but it's essential to recognize that these excessive penalties will not prevent on-farm accidents in the future," he said.

The bill passed with unanimous Republican support and while Democrats were virtually split over the measure.

Tractors and Doodlebugs were featured at the Half Century show. The idea came about when Mark Dozier and Keith Ladage were at Historic Days in Penfield, Ill., in 2024. Both loved the farmer ingenuity of the tractors.

"Conversion tractors and doodlebugs showcase farmer's creativity, and each piece is different. All the ones that came to our exhibit, even if they were a conversion tractor that used the same kit, were unique," Dozier said. "Most had a single transmission, and they were mostly converted from Ford Model A's and T's."

Doodlebugs are cars with items added that could make them work like a tractor, depending on what they had on hand. Each one of these is completely its own creation. In its day, the doodlebug, and the conversion tractors were the poor man's tractor. Collectors brought displays from Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin. Dozier said he is interested in these tractors "because they caught a small time in agricultural history when people made do with what they had. They are mostly pre-WWII. If you had money, you made the conversion, if not, you did it yourself with what you had."

The Half Century is always a chance to see new and unique items. Josh Salm, of Kiel, Wis., was at the Half Century of Progress, with his half scale model 8020 John Deere tractor.

Heritage Iron magazine, owned by Sherry Schaefer, has been a premier sponsor of the Half Century of Progress almost since the beginning. Schaefer publishes two bi-monthly magazines under her publishing company, 3-Point Ink in Greenville, Ill. Both are antique tractor magazines, Heritage Iron, the premier magazine

for Muscle tractor enthusiasts, and Oliver Heritage for those that love the Oliver brand. She also produces other books and merchandise as well. On her website she shares, "We know tractors are not just pieces of machinery, but a part of families and their heritage, and we keep that in mind with every publication we put our name on."

At the Half Century show, Heritage Iron had a very special tent. "This year Heritage Iron features number ones. We have eight number one's, or one of ones." These muscle beauties were the first Allis-Chalmers D21, first Farmall 806 diesel, first Allis-Chalmer 210, first Allis-Chalmers 8070, first Allis-Chalmers 4WD 220, an Oliver prototype, first Case prototype 2296, and one homebuilt tractor.

The Oliver prototype, Schaefer discovered. "I found this two years ago at a show in Oakley, Mich."

Some agricultural celebrities were at the show, like Max Armstrong, and one young YouTuber, Rylan Maney, from Evart, Mich. This young entrepreneur is 13 years old and has started his own Old Iron Farm Toys YouTube channel. He also writes a column for the children's farm magazine, Little Green. "I have awa'ys liked toys since I was little," Rylan said. "I have been collecting since I was 7. I like to collect all brands, but focus on Ford, and John Deere."

Not only does he like all brands, but he also likes all models as well. "I collect 1/16th, 1/32nd, but mostly 1/64th scale, with a few oddball scales."

Almost everyone that attended the Half Century of Progress could add in something they saw, or someone they met. This event brings people from all over the U.S. and around the world to celebrate vintage agriculture.





Safety expert: Rollovers are just 'tip of the iceberg' of farm deaths

LONDON, Ohio — Farm safety has been a hot topic at every Farm Science Review since 1963. And with good reason. Agriculture is considered one of the most dangerous industries in the

businesses, high school agricultural safety programs, collegiate safety and health courses at Ohio State University and is an OSHA outreach trainer. Jepsen and her Grain CART (Comprehensive Agriculture Rescue Trailer) rescue simulator are a regular fixture at each Farm Science Review.

"We're here every year and we need to be here every year," says Jepsen, who points to a constant stream of farm accidents and fatalities on farms each year. "Farm accidents are continuous, and it's not just happening to the older farmers. Accidents are happening to new and beginning farmers, as well as to those returning to the farm."

Jepsen has been with the OSU Agricultural Safety and Health Program since 1992. She has responsibility for teaching, extension and research in occupational safety and health.

"Injuries or death can strike those on the small farm, too. People with a small property and perhaps a small tractor can find themselves in harm's way as those small tractors have all the dangers all the others to," she said.

Tractor rollovers are the top cause for death on the farm. Jepsen says tractor rollovers become lethal when operated on unstable terrain without adequate rollover protection or proper operator training.

"Nearly 59 percent of Ohio farm-related rollover fatalities could be eliminated if every tractor had a roll bar device with a seatbelt," Jepsen said. "Retrofit kits are available for any

make and model and typically cost between \$800 and \$1,200."

Right behind in terms of fatalities are farmers who get caught in the power take-off shaft. Left uncovered, a PTO shaft can entangle a farmer's shirt sleave or trouser cuff.

"We're seeing fewer fatalities or injuries from PTOs the past few years as they're now encased and there's guards now," she said. "The engineering on these PTOs are much better, but if the farmer chooses to take these guards off they're putting themselves back in danger."

Another danger is when farm equipment meets the public on a rural road.

"We've kept statistics on roadway safety for the farm since 1962 and it still remains a problem to this day," Jepsen said. "As you hit the roads in the spring, ensure that your tractor and equipment lights are working properly. The state of Ohio was the first to put extremity lighting into law. If you have dual wheels or a piece of equipment trailing behind that blocks the view of the extremity lights on the tractor, you're required to operate with the proper lighting and marking, especially from sunset to sunrise. It's also good practice to have an escort vehicle

behind equipment on roadways."

While rollovers, PTOs and rural road hazards are high on Jepsen's list of trouble spots, there are many others, she says.

"Rollovers happen all too often and these tragedies make the headlines, but there are dozens of dangers lurking on any farm," Jepsen said.

Jepsen says equipment like harvesters, balers and augers can cause severe injuries when safety measures fail. Grain bin and silo accidents are always a farm tragedy waiting to happen.

"Proper training of operators and regular equipment inspections can greatly reduce the chances of accidents," she said. "With bins and silos, suffocation from being trapped in grain or exposure to gases is a persistent threat. Installing proper ventilation systems and using safety harnesses can significantly reduce these threats.

"Now is the time farmers enter their bins to check on them, unload, and clean them," Jepson said. "Grain dust is a hazard farmers need to protect themselves from while sweeping out their bins. And the only thing to really protect you from that level of contamination is the N95 respirator, an N99 respirator, or a P100 respirator."

Jepsen says that lower on the threat list, though still problematic, is livestock handling, chemical exposure and falls.

"Animals can be unpredictable," Jepsen said. "Even experienced farmers can face injuries from being kicked, bitten or crushed. Proper use of restraining equipment, such as cattle chutes and harmesses, can help reduce

risks. Pesticides, fertilizers and other dangerous chemicals may cause short-term and long-term health risks when not handled with proper equipment and protection. Falls are a big problem as well. Farms often have elevated work areas like silos and lofts, where falls can cause serious injury or death."

While many manure pits are now underground; they still can cause issues through the gases. "It's mostly the gases from those manure pits when people run into problems. Recently they were four members of a family from Colorado that they were working on their dairy farm and were overcome by the fumes from manure pit. Sadly, one went down and they kept trying to rescue each other and they all eventually succumbed."

Still, some manure pits remain above ground. Reed Hosteler, 31, died on his family's dairy farm in Marshall-ville, Ohio, on March 5. He drowned in a manure pit after the tractor he was driving overturned.

Crashes, lacerations, punctures, burns, head and spinal injuries are reported incidences that Jepson sees on a regular basis. Even electrocution can

"In April, a 45-year-old man from Leesburg, Ohio, was electrocuted after his farm tractor hit a power line. His tractor was pulling an agricultural sprayer when one of the sprayer's booms made contact with an overhead power line," she said.

Just as safety management gets implemented on the farm, so should stress management.

"We should be talking to farmers about resources to manage stress and discussing the particulars of farm stress with counselors, therapists, and crisis hotlines" she said



SLF found in Knox County, Tenn.

NASHVILLE — A report from a citizen in East Tennessee led to the discovery of Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) in Knox County, Tenn.

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture (TDA) confirmed the SLF detection after inspectors and a TDA detection dog verified 15 adult SLF on a tree of heaven. This marks the first detection of the invasive insect in Knox County.

"Citizen reports are essential in stopping the spread of this destructive pest," Commissioner Charlie Hatcher, D.V.M., said. "This non-native insect threatens the health and viability of several agricultural businesses in our state. We want your help in watching out for this pest and reporting and eliminating any you find."

SLF are invasive insects that attack a wide variety of plants, from grapevines and fruit trees to hardwoods. They deposit egg masses on nearly any solid object, including vehicles, trailers, firewood, outdoor gear, furniture, and toys. People and their belongings can unknowingly carry these eggs, allowing the pest to spread far beyond its original range.

TDA urges Tennesseans to help protect the state's agriculture and natural resources:

Next, stomp the insect and destroy egg masses by smashing them or dousing them with rubbing alcohol.

Check vehicles, boats, campers, and outdoor equipment to make sure take photos and report the sighting they are free of SLF or egg masses before moving them.

USDA raises 2025, 2026 milk output, citing increased cow numbers

The Agriculture Department raised its estimate of 2025 and 2026 milk output in its World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates, citing increased cow numbers and a faster rate of growth in output per cow.

production marketings were projected at 230.0 and 229.0 billion pounds respectively, up 800 million on both from a month ago. If realized, both would be up 4.1 billion pounds or 1.8 percent from 2024.

2026 production and marketings were projected at 231.3 and 230.3 billion pounds respectively, up 900 million pounds from a month ago. If realized, both would be up 1.3 billion pounds or 0.6 percent from 2025.

Price forecasts for cheese, butter and nonfat dry milk (NDM) were lowered for 2025 based on recent price declines and increased milk supplies. The whey price forecast was unchanged. Class III and Class IV price forecasts were reduced on lower dairy product prices.

Look for the 2025 Class III price to average \$18.20 per hundredweight, down 30 cents from last month's estimate, and compares to \$18.89 in 2024 and \$17.02 in 2023. The 2026 average, at \$17.40, is down 45 cents from a month ago.

The Class IV is expected to average \$18.15 in 2025, down 80 cents from last month's estimate, and compares to \$20.75 in 2024 and \$19.12 in 2023. The 2026 average was projected at \$17.25, down \$1.60 from a month ago.

Nebraska has confirmed its first case of bird flu in a dairy herd. There are now 1,080 confirmed cases in 18 states. The U.S. milk supply remains safe due to

steps taken by the industry as well as the pasteurization process itself.

The latest U.S. Dairy Supply and Utilization report had some interesting take-aways. HighGround Dairy's Cara Murphy stated in the Sept. 22 Dairy Radio Now broadcast that even though U.S. dairy exports were the secon-highest on record and up over 200 percent from a year ago, cheese utilization totaled 1.2

billion pounds, off 0.4 percent.

Domestic usage, which makes up over 90 percent of cheese usage, was down 2.7 percent and the lowest level since July 2022. She said retail sales were good but food service wasn't. Cheese exports were up 29.4 percent, thanks to low U.S. prices.

Butter utilization was up 5.4 percent, primarily due to all-time high exports which were up 208.3 percent. Domestic consumption, which also accounts for over 90 percent of total usage according to Murphy, was off 0.8 percent. High-Ground says "Limited domestic demand could help to explain the significant price decline on the CME spot market over the past month as strong production keeps butter volumes plentiful."

Nonfat dry milk (NFDM) and skim milk power (SMP) utilization was down 1.3 percent, thanks to exports being down 15.7 percent. Domestic demand was up 83.1 percent and has supported CME prices, says HGD, "holding above \$1.20 per pound since early May, but this dynamic has recently shifted following the decline of global skim milk powder prices as

The moon enters its second quarter on Sept. 29.

The Major Planets of September

Look for Jupiter high in Gemini before dawn. Saturn comes Poor Will's Almanack up in the middle of the night and By Bill Felker remains in the sky throughout the day. Red Mars in Virgo and giant Venus in Leo will be the Evening Stars.

When-Then Phenology

When the ash trees turn red and gold, then the season of killing frosts has arrived.

When the day's length falls below 12 hours, then the sugar beet, pear, cabbage and cauliflower harvests commence in the Great Lakes region. In Wisconsin, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Oregon and Washington State, the cranberry harvest begins as berries darken in the cooler weather.

When goldenrod flowers are tufted and gray, then daddy longlegs disappear from the undergrowth and bird migrations reach their peak.

Natural Calendar

The temporal countryside of Yellow Springs takes on its autumnal contours from the increasingly violent movements of the Earth's atmosphere as it tilts away from the sun.

Graphs of barometric pressure reveal many of the topographical patterns of the season. August's barometric configurations are slow and gentle like low, rolling dunes. Heat waves show up as wide plateaus. Thunderstorms are sharp, shallow troughs in the mellow waves of the atmospheric landscape.

At the close of Late Summer, the year has begun its ascent to the steep cliffs of December. By the beginning of October, the barometric waves are stronger; the high-pressure peaks become taller; the lows are deeper, with almost every valley bringing rain.

Tapering floral sequences and the gradual surge of leaf turn occur amid the diminishing expanse of middle September. From the broad lowland of warmth with its six months of birdinsect calls, the sun pulls the land up into the foothills of the year where asters and goldenrod bloom and where trees are gold and red.

Middle Fall is the rough piedmont of another coun-

try, stripping foliage, putting buds into dormancy, burning away the undergrowth and revealing the dark hillsides. At the end

of Late Fall, December's great range of cold and snow fills the horizon. Beyond it lies another immense upland, the frigid, high plateau of Deep Winter in which nothing ever seems to grow or change until the ground crumbles and gives way, shattered by thaws, and time tumbles down into the sudden, stormy gorge of March.

Compensation

There is an emptiness at the end of early fall, an absence of flowers and birdsong, the slowing of the pulse of the crickets, the opening of the sky in the woods when leaves come down, and sometimes I try to fill the gap in time with whatever is close at hand.

Today, I felt that everything was eluding me, and thinking I might have missed what was most important. I went close to what I had nearby, found seed heads everywhere, spent rose petals, rose hips I should have pruned, dried hydrangea blossoms covered in spiderwebs, Joe Pye bushy and dun like burdock, three blue spiderworts out of season, hops heavy across the euonymus, oodles of black redbud seeds like manes in the branches, the soft green seeds of the fierce wood nettle, new waterleaf leaves, mottled grape vines, red crab apples bigger than I'd ever noticed before, stiff and prickly burrs of purple coneflowers, the unusual brightness of honeysuckle berries in the afternoon light.

All things around me seemed benign and soothing: a handful of soft, dark red raspberries from the patch that failed to produce much of anything this year, crabgrass gone to seed, its claws not threatening but protective, the summer mallow crumbling away, a skipper and a naked lady butterfly and a cabbage white ruffled by the breeze in the zinnias, the white fall crocus

song and its hundred days of half drooped, the highest branches of the hackberry bare, honeybees climbing in the asters, and the chirping and chirping of sparrows north of the gar-

well as rising U.S. milk supplies."

The tariffs have influenced this market and Murphy said they are paying attention to them, but she cited Oceania pricing being a bigger factor, as well as the strong milk output we're seeing in the U.S., Europe, South America and New Zealand. If powder prices fall globally, she said the U.S. may recover some market share.

Dry whey usage was up 12.5 percent but was against an extremely weak July 2024 number, according to HGD. Murphy said China stepped back into the market after some trade issues were settled, but pointed to the high protein products, the whole protein concentrates and isolates, and said they are what's holding up the whey market as "people just can't get enough protein in their foods."

As expected, the Fed lowered its benchmark interest rate a quarter point this week, first reduction in nine months, and indicated there'll be additional cuts ahead. Meanwhile, CME block Cheddar was trading Thursday morning at \$1.6825 per pound, as traders were anticipating Monday's August Milk Production report. The blocks closed Friday at \$1.6150. The barrels were at \$1.64 per pound Thursday, after finishing Friday at \$1.6125.

Contacts in the Central region tell Dairy Market News that mild temperatures are contributing to increasing milk production. Demand from Class I processors is taking up much of the additional production, keeping spot availability somewhat limited. Mid-week prices were trading flat to \$2-over Class. Cheese production is steady in the Central region. Demand from food service and retail customers is steady. Export interest is strong, though some contacts

Cheese manufacturers in the West indicate ease in securing milk. Production is steady. Domestic retail demand is steady. Food service demand continues to be weaker. Export demand is mixed as U.S. prices remain competitive but price points are generally weakening for cheese produced outside of the US as well.

The meltdown continued in the butter, dripping to \$1.77 per pound Wednesday, lowest CME price since Oct. 11, 2021, but it rallied Wednesday and was trading Thursday morning at \$1.8050, following a Friday close at \$1.86.

Central milk production and component levels were strong throughout the summer months, keeping churns active, says DMN, and that has contributed to the current bearishness. Cream is plentiful in the Central region and demand is softening. Declining prices were causing some bulk purchasers to hold off.

Cream is also widely available in the West and demand from butter producers is somewhat stronger as cream has become more affordable. Butter production is stronger but remains below 100 percent capacity. Churn equipment projects are closer to completion and expected to bring more churning back online in fourth quarter. Retail production continues to be more of a priority than bulk production. Demand from domestic and international buyers is steady to stronger, says DMN.

Grade A nonfat dry milk fell to \$1.14 per pound Wednesday, lowest since March 25, 2025, but closed Thursday at \$1.1450, after finishing Friday at \$1.1650.

Dry whey was trading Thursday at 63 cents per pound, highest CME price since January 31, 2025. Its Friday finish was at 59.25 cents per pound.

The October Federal order Class I base milk price was announced by the USDA at \$18.04 per hundredweight, down 66 cents from September, \$5.13 below a year ago, and the lowest Class I since June. It equates to \$1.55 per gallon, down from \$1.99 a year ago. The Class I average stands at \$19.24, down from \$20.02 a year ago, and compares to \$19.09 in 2023.

Dairy margins continued to weaken the first half of September as milk prices succumbed to further losses while feed costs remained steady, according to the latest Margin Watch (MW) from Chicago-based Commodity and Ingredient Hedging LLC. "A sharp drop in both butter and cheese has pressured milk futures as growing supplies begin to overcome strong demand," the MW stated.

The MW warned "The combination of increasing milk output and rising component levels, with the July fat test of 4.13 percent up 0.06 points from last year has caused butter production to rise 9.8 percent from July 2024 to 180.1 million pounds, the

Cattle producers showing renewed interest in using sudangrass in pastures to add nutrition, feed volume

AMES, Iowa – While the popularity of sudangrass has fluctuated over the years, cattle producers have shown a renewed interest in its use as pasture acres have decreased and drought issues have impacted perennial pasture quality, according to Grant Dewell, Iowa State University (ISU) associate professor of veterinary medicine and beef extension veterinarian.

In fact, he said the use of sudangrass and similar sorghum-sudangrass hybrids in pastures to add nutrition and feed volume for cattle has been around for a long time.

"Sudangrass was introduced into the U.S. in the early 1900s, and became a common pasture crop," he said. "Sudangrass grows in warm and hot conditions, and is fairly drought-tolerant and can produce large quantities of forage."

According to ISU, sudangrass is a fast-growing, warm-season annual grass of the sorghum family used primarily for forage (i.e., hay, pasture, silage), and as a cover crop for nutrient scavenging and weed suppression. It's also known for its rapid growth, high biomass production and ability to regrow after cutting or grazing, ISU added.

Shelby Gruss, ISU assistant professor of agronomy and forage extension specialist, said, "There has definitely been more interest in the last few years, but I would not limit it to sudangrass. Producers are showing increased interest in summer annuals in general as a way to boost productivity.

"This practice is especially useful in sacrifice lots (or dry lots that are non-grazing, small, enclosed areas for livestock used to protect pastures from overgrazing, damage from mud, or during renovation), or calving pastures where the perennial stand is weaker and less productive," she said.

Gruss added the practice involves planting a summer annual like sudangrass following the spring flush of cool-season growth, typically in early to mid-June.

She said the general steps of sudangrass management are: grazing or mowing the perennial stand low just prior to planting to open the canopy for seedling establishment; drilling (the practice of planting summer annual forage crops like sorghum-sudangrass by sowing their seeds directly into the soil) the summer annual (sudangrass); allowing about 40 days of growth (depending on species and environmental conditions) before grazing; and evaluating the stand after grazing.

"Nitrogen application will likely improve summer annual productivity, but timing is critical," Gruss said. "Since the

perennial stand already has an established root system, nitrogen should be applied when the summer annual is actively growing and cool-season perennials are slowing down. Research on this is limited, so current recommendations are more hypothetical than proven."

Dewell said, "As a fairly rapidly growing forage crop, sudangrass can be grazed. It's generally safer to use a rotational grazing system with fairly high stocking rates so cattle graze all the sudangrass down and then move off.

"If you leave cattle on too long where parts of the pasture are starting to regrow, cattle will prefer the new lush forage, which can have higher levels of prussic acid (a highly poisonous and rapidly acting chemical compound that can be released from certain plants and is lethal to livestock and humans)," he said, adding that farmers should "increase stocking density and (move) off in a few days to minimize toxicity (from high levels of prussic acid) and allow the plant to regrow.

"Prussic acid toxicity is a concern,

but it can be managed," he said. "Generally, sudangrass is safer than forage sorghums, but good management is still important. Once the forage is at least 18 inches tall, it is safe to graze during summer grazing season. Be mindful of regrowth when managing pastures. In the fall when frost conditions exist, cattle should be removed from sudangrass pastures for seven days to allow the prussic acid to dissipate."

Andrew P. Griffith, University of Tennessee professor of agricultural and resource economics, said, "One good time to use a sudangrass hybrid is when a pasture is going to be renovated in the fall. A person can chemically control a good portion of the weeds and then plant sudangrass hybrids that will provide enough competition to kill a lot of what was not controlled chemically.

"It is also appropriate to use it when there will be a need for a large quantity of high-quality forage in a short time span," he added. "It has the ability to

ime to plan for harvest and for grain storage needs

With August gone and crops ripening, our fall work is about to begin. Planning that work and making decisions about the coming year are crucial, especially this year.

This has been a crazy year for the weather here in the Midwest. How this will affect harvest is anyone's guess. It does appear that the excess moisture we've received this year is making way for a good crop. The downside is that prices are dismal, at best. I spent the spring and early summer thinking that the bottom for corn was \$4 and soybeans was \$10. As of this writing, beans have come back a tad over \$10 but corn remains on a downward slide.

With so many of us on the edge during the second year of sub-breakeven prices, it's clear that business as usual will not pay the bills. One thing that strikes me as something we need to do is ad-

dress grain storage. There are hundreds if not thousands of old 10-15,000-bushel bins sitting empty. Considered small by today's standards, they may provide the storage we need to manage grain sales to our advantage. Simple math, a 10 cent move upward on corn means \$1,000 in real money. With local prices around \$3.50 a bushel, it is reasonable to expect a 25-cent movement upward in the next three-six months, maybe by the end of harvest. That's \$2,500 in real money for every 10,000 bushels of corn. If you have 500 acres of corn that produces the national average of 176 bushels per acre, that's 88,000 bushels of corn. That's \$22,000 available with storage alone. I think we'll see \$4 corn next spring. Now we're \$44,000 in real money. Is \$22,000 worth looking throughout the neighborhood for empty, dormant bins?

So, what else can we do? Go over your harvest equipment and replace everything worn and suspect. While an initial expense, it can/will save you repairs that will be larger in scope as parts failures have a ripple effect, causing other failures as well. In addition, if you can avoid breakdowns "in harvest," the time you save is often of greater value than the cash expense.

We will also need to use the ROI (Return On Investment) model for virtually every decision we make. Every decision is about placing "convenience and comfort" at the bottom of the list of requirements. Frankly, I've been concerned about how many young farmers have continued to spend money on vacations, etc., that is money spent from a no profit position. I get that we have a

environment of entitlement. The money was available, and we could choose to spoil our families, a bit. What these two generations don't realize is the years of sacrifice that preceded the last couple of decades. And as always, the good times won't last forever and these expensive luxuries are fleeting, only momentarily satisfying.

Before you think I am against family events, I am not. I believe that if you utilize less expensive options for recreation, in years like this one, the likelihood of creating memories of much more meaning is more likely. Renting a camper and taking a road trip will allow you to spend quality time that is not being orchestrated by some business trying to get more money out of your billfold. More profitable times will come again, and you can take advantage of cruises and resort vacations then. From personal experience, your family will find many more memories in personal time than commercial.

produce a lot of high-quality feedstuff at a high quantity, if fertilized correctly. This does require some input, but it can be beneficial."

He said, "In my mind, it is another tool in the tool kit. I would not call it a specialty tool, but it also is not a tool that is used every day. There are some risks as they tend to collect nitrates when moisture is not adequate. They do take capital and labor as they have to be seeded every year."

Gruss said, "Adding summer annuals (like sudangrass) can help boost forage production during the summer slump. However, it's important to also plan for what comes next, whether that involves weed management, over-seeding, or other stand improvements."

Griffith said, "They (sudangrass) are

most successful being planted into a clean seedbed whether that be no-tilled in a field that the competition was chemically controlled, or in a tilled field with no weed competition.

"There are people who interseed (plant seeds of a cover crop or forage into an existing crop or pasture), but I have never experienced a situation where this was the best method to accumulate the best production from a quantity standpoint," he said.

"Thus, planting into a clean seedbed is the environment where production can be maximized, but these hybrids also require appropriate fertilization to produce well," he added. "In most cases, most grazing operations would be better off with a warm-season perennial (like switchgrass, which possesses mechanisms that allow it to tolerate cold temperatures during winter as dormant plants), but there are situations where these warm-season annuals (like sudangrass) can be beneficial."

Craft distillers are tapping into vanishing heirloom corn varieties

PAXTON, Ill. - In an effort to diversify the uses for vanishing varieties of heirloom corn, Illinois specialty crop grower Will Glazik and the IDEA Farm Network participated in a 2022 project that succeeded in demonstrating the potential for long-forgotten varieties like "Bloody Butcher" and "Wapsie Valley" as a source for craft whiskeys. The modest \$17,530 study, part of the North Central Region SARE (Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education) Farmer Rancher Project, has helped germinate new market opportunities for small, specialty growers to supply heirloom corn varieties to the still-growing Midwest craft distilling sector.

"We utilize a corn called Bloody Butcher in our bourbon, but there are other distilleries using blue corn or orange corn or white corn. We worked with the University of Illinois - at the time we didn't yet have our production license - and we sent them five different varieties of corn," said Glazik, whose family's specialty operation includes Cow Creek Farm (www.facebook.com/ cowcreekorganics/) and Silver Tree Spirits (www.silvertreebeerspirits.com/ home). Their state farm distillery utilizes grain that comes from Cow Creek and nearby farms to produce bourbon, rye and wheat whiskeys, as well as vodka.

"A friend sent in some blue corn, another sent in some white, and another sent heirloom yellow. We also had conventional GMO yellow, and we wanted to see if we kept all production practices the same on the whiskey, what a sensory panel and analytical analysis

would come up with. We were looking for quantitative differences between the taste of the different varieties of color and we did," he added.

Located in Paxton (Ford County) in north-central Illinois, the area encompassing Glazik's specialty farm was deemed an ideal location to grow the heirloom corn varieties, where each can develop distinct characteristics with the potential to create unique flavor profiles.

"We are a fifth-generation farm, certified organic, with 800 acres of diversified row crops along with cattle. We work with a number of other farmers in our area who are also certified organic through equipment sharing and technical support, as well as on farms where we don't have livestock, we will have neighbors bring in livestock. All of our grain is grown food-grade and a portion of that goes to our distillery," Glazik said.

To conduct the NCR-SARE experiment, Glazik, his brothers Clayton and Dallas, and others grew five heirloom corn varieties for distillation at the University of Illinois Pilot Processing Lab. In addition, tests to determine the chemical compounds in each of the corn samples were conducted. After distillation was complete, a panel of flavor testers convened for a tasting at the U of I to sample the distillates and compare results.

"The U of I mashed all of the samples and distilled them at the same proof, and then we had a sensory panel of farmers, distillers and people in the industry. We were able to quantitatively define the differences between the varieties, looking at how the color affects the

flavor," Glazik said before delving into the various flavor profiles.

"Yellow tastes like the yellow you find in most of the bourbon consumed. Even open-pollinated yellow tasted more similar to GMO yellow than it did to, say, a blue or a red. The reds are a little more spicy; they pair well with ice so we make a heavy rye blended bourbon with the red, which we market under the Cow Creek Farm name The blue is more subtle and floral, and a lot softer than the red or any of the other colors, so we use it in gins or light whiskeys, something that is approachable for all kinds of palettes," Glazik explained.

He noted that the white corn-distilled whiskey surprised the tasting panel due to its unpleasant taste. However, Glazik chalks that experience up to the corn variety since he's tasted white corn whiskies with a more pleasant palette.

The study also served to establish where growers might sell their heirloom corn varieties. With the spirits industry rapidly growing in the Midwest, many distilleries are willing to pay a higher price for unique products. Glazik is taking advantage of the popularity of the craft distillers industry by marketing the family's own bourbons made with yellow non-GMO corn (Prairie City, after the former name of Paxton) and blue corn (coming this fall), in addition to their red-based Cow Creek bourbon.

"My 6-year-old son has become a corn breeder and has been breeding a blue corn variety for the last couple of years. We've got enough of it saved up and we're going to age his own barrel of bourbon for 15 years, so he'll be able to open it up when he's 21," Glazik said.

The study's results have been shared with grain distillers, farmers, crop scientists and others through networks such as the IDEA Farm Network, OGRAIN, Rodale Institute, The Land Connection, Artisan Grain Collaborative and ReGenerate Illinois, encouraging the adoption of heirloom corn in the production of spirits.

"We've been able to really share this as much as possible, and it's been well received. It's been a really fun story," said Glazik, whose experimentation with heirloom corn varieties appears to be in line with what many whiskey entrepreneurs are doing to sustain and expand the craft whiskey market.

American whiskey has "never been more exciting," according to The Whiskey Reviewer (www.whiskeyreviewer. com), with many craft distilleries across the United States carving out their own space in the whiskey world through the sourcing of local products.

"In 2025, these small-batch producers are not just experimenting with flavor, they are helping redefine what American whiskey can be," according to the website. "What sets this new wave apart isn't just scale but spirit. These distilleries embrace local ingredients, revive forgotten techniques, and unexpectedly age their spirits. The result? Bold, innovative, and highly drinkable whiskey that challenges conventional norms and excites even the most seasoned sippers."

In addition to selling their non-GMO and heirloom corn grain to other distilleries, Glazik's Cow Creek Farm operates a retail shop in Paxton that is open by appointment and distributes their products to area retail outlets through a food distribution company. HyVee, County Market, Vinny's and other well-known food and liquor stores stock Cow Creek Farm products.





Fiber producers, artisans looking to grow their market; finding local mills a challenge

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Ohio is home to a number of wool-bearing animals and there is an abundance of fiber being produced in the state. However, there is not an abundance of mills for farmers to take the fiber to.

This need was the topic of discussion at Ohio State University's College of Food, Agricultural and Environmental Sciences' "Farm to Fashion: Natural fiber footprints and futures" event last spring where Ohio farmers and natural fiber advocates discussed the future of a natural fiber industry in the state. And they agreed on one thing: Ohio needs more mills to process the large amount of fiber from small producers across the state.

"Local mills are becoming harder to find," said Laurel Shouvlin, an alpaca farmer and owner of Bluebird Hills Farm in Springfield, Ohio. "Many wool producers in Ohio used to send their fiber to Mid-States Wool Growers Cooperative, and then ship it off to be processed into yarn or fabric. But after more than a century of business, that company closed its doors in 2023, citing there was no market for wool."

Shouvlin and Celeste Navarre Stewart, a fashion and fiber artist, are at the forefront of promoting this natural fiber. The pair began traveling across the country in 2018 to promote sustainable fibers for clothing at conferences and fiber events, looking for more mills willing to process their fiber as there are few options in Ohio.

Shouvlin has been raising Huacaya and Suri alpacas on her farm since 1998. She sends her fine fiber, mostly

made from Suri fleece, to a small local mill in Oxford, Ohio, to be made into yarn. When she gets the yarn back, she uses plants like goldenrod, ragweed, nettle and pokewood to naturally dye the yarn, in addition to other dyes, and weaves the yarn into products for sale. She also sells dyed yarn.

Shouvlin sells her products at fiber festivals and local stores, but like most wool producers and other natural fiber farmers, finding a local mill that will skirt, pick, card, dye, scour and blend is a needle in a haystack. Most fiber enthusiasts like Shouvlin will say that all this is time-consuming and shipping to out-of-state mills can be expensive.

Ohio does have a few mini mills still operating, however. Carrie Davis and her husband, Robbie, own and operate America's Natural Fiberworks, a small mill in Somerville, Ohio, where they process fiber into yarn. Shouvlin often sends her raw fiber to this mill, which is inundated with work.

The Davises remain quite busy. Clear plastic bags and cardboard boxes of fiber are stacked against the wall of a room at their mini mill. They receive fiber from Colorado, Arkansas and other states in addition to Ohio.

"We get batches of fiber from a wide variety of animals," Carrie said. "We have sheep, bunny, yak and even Persian cat."

Since 2015, Ron and Dianne Ganslein have been operating Ohio Valley Farm & Fiber Mill in Peebles, Ohio. The couple utilizes refurbished, antique milling equipment, some dating back to the 19th century.

There's enough mohair from Angora goats in the Buckeye State to produce things like sweaters, hats and even upholstery. And there are roughly 119,000 sheep and lambs raised annually in Ohio alone, indicating a significant presence of wool producers in the state.


The lack of mills in the state hasn't put a dent in the fiber enthusiasm, however. There are many fleece and fiber shows across Ohio each year and more artisans and farmers are getting involved.
