Illinois farmer-leader praises USDA livestock plan, cites faults

CISSNA PARK, Ill. – According to Ed Dubrick, a specialty farmer and policy organizer for the Illinois Stewardship Alliance, there are several key factors contributing to the economic crisis facing agricultural producers. One of them is market consolidation. Four companies – Tyson Foods, Cargill, JBS and National Beef – own 85 percent of the U.S. beef market share, according to the USDA. In addition, the three largest meatpacking firms control 63 percent of pork packing, 46 percent of beef packing and 38 percent of poultry, PoliticalReview.org revealed.

The USDA also notes that three seed companies – Bayer, Corteva Agriscience and Syngenta – control 80 percent of the genetics market. In addition, four food companies – Walmart, Kroger, Costco and Albertsons – own one-third of all U.S. grocery stores, while Nestle, PepsiCo, Coca-Cola, Unilever and Mars dominate global food and beverage production.

"All of these factors are in play while we have failed to meaningfully enforce anti-trust laws for a long time. This (non-enforcement) has allowed consolidation to occur and create unfair marketplaces for both farmers and consumers, with people struggling all across our food and farm system," according to Dubrick, a north-central Illinois producer of chickens, turkeys, laying hens, sheep and fresh produce. Dubrick is concerned that when you factor lower international demand for many farm commodities into the mix, non-compliance with federal antitrust laws exhibited by major food companies adds to the already-stacked deck producers face when trying to turn an economic profit.

"We need meaningful enforcement; whether it's the Sherman Act that dates

back to 1890, or the Packers and Stockyards Act, which dates to 1921, we have the laws on the books but we've neglected to enforce or uphold them," he said. "When Standard Oil was broken up, their market share wasn't as large as some of these companies we are talking about today. We've allowed this to perpetuate, and we need anti-monopoly busting to restore fair marketplaces and break up both price-fixing and price-gouging."

Opinions vary as to why the U.S. has eschewed enforcement of the violation of anti-trust laws in recent years, with one school of thought assigning a shift in legal and economic philosophy toward an approach that recognizes economic efficiency over fairness as a cause. Lobbying by large food companies, limited resources of regulatory and enforcement agencies and the difficulty in proving harm to the consumer are also all cited as contributing to the shift in anti-trust law thinking. In addition, weakening of laws such as the Robinson-Pittman Act, which prohibits price discrimination, due to court actions could also be a factor, according to the National Grocers Association.

While he and his colleagues with the Alliance are fighting against powerful monopolies controlling the food system, Dubrick is also concerned about President Donald Trump's suggestion the U.S. purchase Argentinian beef to manipulate the value of the U.S. beef market in favor of the consumer. He also believes that any beef product imported into the U.S. should carry a country of origin label (COOL).

"When the consumer doesn't even know what they are buying, it removes their option to say, 'I want to support the American farmer, I want to support my neighbor," said Dubrick, whose Iroquois County farm is around 50 minutes northeast of Champaign-Urbana. "We don't currently have mandatory COO labeling on beef and pork, so why would a large packer tell you if they're selling Argentinian beef? They would hide it in secrecy because they wouldn't want you to know."

The Alliance policy activist and small farmer said that after poring over the USDA's emergency plan for the livestock industry, issued by Secretary Brooke Rollins on Oct. 20, he found "a lot of good" on behalf of livestock producers within the 13-page white paper. "I think it's a step in the right direction, but I don't think it goes far enough. I'm glad that USDA has been receptive to the constructive criticism they've received from farmers, but I would like to see the

Farmers sentiments mixed over new U.S.-China soybean trade deal

AVON, Ind. – While the new trade agreement between the Trump Administration and China has been welcomed news for many U.S. farm organizations, others are mixed about the deal.

On Oct. 30, China pledged buy 12 million tons of U.S. soybeans this season and at least 25 million tons annually for the next three years. As part of the trade agreement, China said it will suspend all the retaliatory tariffs applied to U.S. agricultural products, including chicken, wheat, corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans, pork, beef, aquatic products, fruits, vegetables and dairy products.

David Hardin, who raises soybeans and corn on his farm near Avon, Ind., and is an Indiana Soybean Alliance board member, said he is cautiously optimistic about the announcement.

"The fact that they have agreed to

take 12 million metric tons this year has been a big boost to the soybean market after months of lacking direction," he said. "The guarantee that China will buy 25 million metric tons per year for the following three years helps give the market some certainty about a minimum level of Chinese business."

However, he said, "We still haven't seen all the details of the agreement, and there hasn't been official confirmation from the Chinese except that U.S. beans will continue to have a 13 percent tariff on them. The 25 million number is near the low end of what sales have been for the last four years, but at least we have a floor under the market now. The last two trade wars have led to a huge expansion of the Brazilian growing area. Competition with South America will only become tougher in the future."

Brian Duncan, president of Illinois Farm Bureau and Ogle, Ill., farmer, said, "We have seen the impact of the



Ohio cattle producers facing fall forage, herd preparation challenges

COLUMBUS, Ohio – According to The Ohio State University (OSU)'s Beef Team, the state's beef producers are facing fall forage and herd preparation challenges.

The OSU team recently evaluated 180 forage samples from across the state and found that overall forage quality was notably poor. Many of the samples, especially first cutting hay, showed significantly reduced protein and energy levels.

"This year brings added complexity: forage quality is down significantly, especially in first cutting hay, which suffered from delayed harvests and excessive rainfall in many regions," said Ted Wiseman, The Ohio State University agriculture and natural resources educator.

Wiseman said this decline is largely attributed to delayed harvests caused by wet spring conditions, which led to overly-mature forage with diminished nutritional value. As a result, producers must be especially cautious when planning winter feeding programs.

In addition, he said, to minimize stress and maximize performance when weaning calves this fall, producers should ensure calves are vaccinated well ahead of weaning and consider creep feeding (a supplemental, nutrient-rich feed provided to nursing calves in a separate area that cows cannot access) to ease the nutritional transition.

"Once calves are separated, it's critical to assess cow body condition," he said. "Cows should enter winter with a body condition score of 5 to 6 to maintain reproductive performance and withstand colder temperatures."

He said pasture management also demands attention as forage growth is

slowing with shorter days and cooler nights, and overgrazing now is possibly compromising spring regrowth.

"Producers are encouraged to walk their pastures, estimate remaining forage, and begin transitioning to stored feeds," he said. "Inventorying hay and silage supplies is essential, especially given the variability in quality. Testing forages for nutrient content will help guide supplementation strategies and avoid costly surprises later.

"Fall is also the ideal time for soil sampling and fertility adjustments," he added. "Maintaining proper soil pH and nutrient levels strengthens forage stands and sets the stage for successful spring growth. Producers planning to frost seed (surface placement of seed in late winter, early spring) legumes should begin preparing pastures now by reducing grazing pressure and controlling weeds."

He also said fall offers a chance to catch up on facility maintenance and herd health tasks, such as repairing fences, checking water systems, and scheduling pregnancy checks and deworming, which can all be done before winter conditions make these jobs more difficult.

"In a year where forage quality has been a real challenge, especially with poor first cutting hay, Ohio beef producers need to stay ahead of the curve," he said. "Evaluating feed inventories, checking cow condition, and making smart pasture decisions this fall will go a long way toward keeping cattle healthy and productive through winter.

"Taking time now to adjust rations, supplement low-quality hay, and prep facilities means fewer problems later and a smoother start to spring," he added.



Richland County operation serves as teaching farm for high school, college students

BUTLER, Ohio - Richland County is home to a farm that is training a new generation of farmers by getting their hands dirty - not with chemicals or modern farm equipment but with antique hand tools and hard work.

Brokaw's Farm & Market is a working and teaching farm run by Michelle Garnsey and her husband, John Brokaw. The farm employs high school and college student interns, along with seasonal help, on its no-spray, teaching farm. "I'm the business owner, and my husband helps a lot," Garnsey said. "I always bounce ideas off of him. He has a full-time off-farm job - he helps when he can, but it's mostly me and the student interns, and the few adults we hire each year to help manage the student interns."

The farm has its roots in personal health. "My husband and I both had health issues that made us rethink what we were eating," she said. "We wanted to grow our own food, as clean as possible." That meant going beyond "organic" – using compost from their own chickens, rotating crops, and relying on manual labor and old-school tools instead of chemicals or machinery.

Michelle and John moved onto the 5-acre property in 2010 to homestead and grow their own food. "We

started small and added a little more each year - more gardens, more projects," Garnsey said. It wasn't until the pandemic hit in 2020 that their private homestead caught the attention of people. "People just started pulling into the driveway, asking if we sold food," she said. "We realized there was a real need."

Initially, they sold fruits and vegetables from their porch. By 2022, porch sales morphed into a fullfledged small business.

In addition to the acreage Brokaw Farm is on, Garnsey rents 5 acres from a local farmer, allowing for up to 7 or 8 acres for production - though today, "it's probably more like 4-4 ½ acres," she said. "It's enough to keep us busy from before sunrise to well after sunset, especially since we do everything by hand."

During the pandemic, Garnsey left her job in education - she has a background in instructional design for online learning - to hike the Appalachian Trail. She funded her venture by working on small farms and hostels, learning about livestock, crops, and the realities of farming. When she returned, she brought that

experience home, committing to replace the grocery store with what she could grow on the farm.

What sets Brokaw Farm & Market apart is its commitment to teaching. In 2024, Garnsey launched a paid internship program for local high school and college students. The goal is sim-

ple: "Most young people interested in farming aren't born into it, and the start-up costs are overwhelming," she said. "We want to show them that you don't need to inherit land or take on debt to get started. You can farm a backyard, or borrow or rent land."



voluntary COOL loophole (closed) that allows meat from other countries that gets ground or packaged in the U.S. to put 'product of the USA' on the label." said Dubrick, adding that USDA should move to require mandatory COOL requirements on all imported beef products coming into the country.

As a producer and consumer, Dubrick said he can't reconcile Trump's thinking when it comes to suggesting the U.S. beef market should be enhanced with imported products. If beef prices are too high, he wonders, why hasn't demand for pork and chicken surged? Why haven't Americans shifted to alternate proteins if prices are too high for beef?

"Consumers still want beef. To say that beef prices are too high is really missing the boat. We need to bust up these monopolies. We need to find levers and policies that we can pull that allow for open and fair and honest marketplaces, ones that allow the little meat processor to get started and grow and challenge the marketplace," he said.

On Oct. 24, Reps. Harriett Hageman (R-Wyo.) and Ro Khanna (D-Calif.) reintroduced the COOL Enforcement Act. It would reinstate mandatory COOL requirements, which were lifted for beef and pork in 2016 under a World Trade Organization ruling, for beef. COOL food laws require retailers to inform customers about the source of their food. Agricultural commodities were once exempted from mandatory COOL laws. In 2002, Congress passed a series of laws implementing COOL

requirements for select commodities, including beef. The law stood until the WTO ruled that mandatory COOL laws were in violation of WTO rules, prompting Congress to remove the requirement for beef.

Hageman and Khanna's bill also raises potential fines for those falsely labeling their beef as made in the U.S., including multinational packers. The bill further dictates that no ruling from an international body, such as the WTO, impacts our country's ability to implement COOL requirements, according to a Hageman news release.

"I'm hopeful that (bill) can move either as a standalone bill or as part of a farm bill, if we ever get to one," Dubrick said. In the meantime, "we need to be investing in more local food systems, so farmers have a fair marketplace, consumers have a choice and we have resilience the next time a pandemic happens, or the next thing that upsets the apple cart."

Returning to the subject of the U.S. importing beef, Dubrick noted that according to many economists, the food system is so consolidated and rigged against both the farmer and the eater that imports are likely to decrease the prices farmers receive. It's also unlikely to impact the price consumers pay at the grocery store.

The Alliance is asking lawmakers to look at long term agricultural reforms, in addition to emergency assistance for farmers "before food security, and in turn national security, are further jeopardized. Washington needs to reprioritize fair markets and diversified domestic production for the viability of farmers, the vibrancy of our communities, and the health and security of our nation."

lack of soybean orders have on the bottom line for farmers in Illinois and across the nation. Our goal is to see fair access for our farmers in foreign markets. We continue to advocate for permanent, enforceable trade agreements that open markets, eliminate unfair barriers and give long-term certainty."

Tom Adam, Iowa Soybean Association (ISA) president and fifth-generation Harper, Iowa, farmer, and Grant Kimberley, ISA senior director of market development and sixth-generation Maxwell, Iowa, farmer, told Farm World in a Nov. 5 joint statement, with the market price for a bushel of soybeans increasing by more than 60 cents on the news of China's purchase, it's a reminder that markets under-performed throughout the year.

"As the markets wait for China's announced purchases to become actual orders, ISA continues to advocate for the EPA's finalization of renewable volume obligations for 2026 (a record 5.61 billion gallons), a reallocation of proposed small refinery exemptions, diversifying international demand through new trade partnerships and addressing chronically high fertilizer and crop input prices that strain farmer cash flow and opportunities for profit," the statement said.

Bob Thompson, Michigan Farmers Union president, told ABC12 News in Flint, concerning the new trade deal, "The idea that there has been a significant gain here is woefully misstated. I think that it's well known that statements are made and then sometimes the follow through isn't as strong as we would like.

"I guess the farmer in me is an internal optimist that likes to think that things are going to turn out well and I certainly hope that that's the case here," he said, adding the new trade agreement falls short of initial expectations. "Certainly, it is better than the zero that we had. But we probably would have had at least twice or more beans shipped."

Ryan Marquardt, Iowa Farmers Union vice president and a Van Meter, Iowa, farmer, said, "The Iowa Farmers Union welcomes any progress that opens markets for U.S. farmers. Farmers know that trade relationships are built on trust. That trust takes years to build, and can be broken in moments, and may take decades to repair.

"We urge the Trump Administration to pursue fair, transparent, and stable trade policies that prioritize family farmers and strengthen the long-term health of Iowa's rural economy," he said. "As a soybean farmer and fifth-generation Iowa farmer, I know my family would appreciate it."

China to buy 12 million metric tons of US soybeans by end of 2025

After several months of waiting, China has finally booked U.S. soybeans for import. This came ahead of the long-awaited meeting between President Donald Trump and President Xi from China. While this was positive for sovbean futures, news of additional China soybean demand was more of a highlight.

Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent has announced China will be buying 12 million metric tons of U.S. soybeans before year end. He further stated China would be buying 25 mmt of U.S. soybeans annually

for the next three years. Bessent also stated other Asian buyers are looking at sourcing 19 mmt of U.S. soybeans, but no timeline was given. No corn or wheat intentions were released, but China is expected to buy "massive" volumes of U.S. sorghum.

There is an underlying issue in China that has impacted the country's commodity demand from any source, and that is deflation. China's economy has struggled ever since the COVID pandemic, despite several rounds of government stimulus that are still taking place. Even with retail costs of most products falling in China, so is demand as consumers are not engaged. This includes food demand as China is reporting a 1.6 percent decline in restaurant sales. This fall in consumer demand has slowed China's appetite for several products, including commodities.

The trade dispute between the United States and China has greatly benefited Brazil soybean exports, but Argentina has also been a benefactor. China booked a large volume of Argentine soybeans when the Argentine government suspended export taxes

well above last year. A larger soybean crop is also allowing Argentina to export more product. The Argentine Ag Minister now says 2024/25 soybean exports will total 12.3 million metric tons, 3 mmt

more than the prior year.

The Energy Industry Administration released data showing expansion in the MARKET ANALYSIS U.S. biofuel industry slowed By Karl Setzer in 2024. Expansion in the

> industry totaled 3 percent in 2024, adding 391 million gallons of renewable diesel and other biofuels. While an increase, this was just one-third of the expansion seen in 2022 and 2023. Reduced margins have slowed expansion in the industry, which is actually favorable long-term as it prevents over-production. Ethanol remains the primary renewable fuel and the only one seeing its expansion build. Total U.S. ethanol capacity stands at 18.5 billion gallons.

> The American Petroleum Institute released a statement that has weighed on the ethanol industry. The API has been a supporter of expanding ethanol use, but the group announced it is withdrawing its backing of year around use of E-15. The group stated an updated approach to E-15 legislation, along with several other changes are needed, and has reached out to the White House to make reforms. The ethanol industry has been hoping for permanent implementation of year around E-15 use since it has been allowed for the past several years anyway.

> The Brazilian soybean crush firm ABIOVE has released updated supply and demand soybean numbers. For production, ABIOVE is predicting a crop of 178.5 million metric tons, up

and helped push soybean demand from their previous 176.8 mmt estimate. Soybean exports are forecast at 111 mmt, an increase of 1.5 mmt from before. ABIOVE is predicting soy meal production of 46.6 mmt and exports of 24.6 mmt, both record large. Soy oil production is also expected to be a record 12.1 mmt, but even so, the country will need to import another 125,000 mt to satisfy projected demand. This import figure is a 25 percent increase from last year.

The analytical firm Rabobank also updated its Brazilian production numbers for both corn and soybeans. Rabobank puts the Brazil soybean crop at 177 mmt, up 3 percent from last year. A 2 percent expansion in plantings is behind the larger crop estimate. Brazil's soybean export forecast was held at 111 mmt, equal to last year as Brazil's domestic soybean consumption is rising as fast as production is.

Rabobank predicts a Brazil corn crop of 137 mmt this year, down 3.5 percent from last year. Corn plantings are forecast to expand by 2.2 percent from a year ago, but a return to normal weather will likely limit yields. The same domestic demand is forecast to cut Brazil's 2026 corn exports to 37 mmt, a year-to-year decline of 5 percent.


More attention is being placed on global production data, and while some regions of the world are producing large crops, some areas are seeing production issues. One of these is the European Union who has trimmed both its grain and oilseed crops. Even so, the EU has not upped its imports of either corn nor soybeans from a year ago. EU corn imports to date total 5 million metric tons versus last year's 6.84 mmt. Soybean imports total 3.62 mmt compared to last year's 4.28 mmt. EU soy meal imports total 5.68 mmt, which is close to last year's 5.89 mmt.

The Federal Reserve lowered its interest rate by an expected 25 basis points in its October meeting. This takes it to a range from 3.75 percent to 4 percent. The vote came in at 10 to 2, with one vote for a larger cut and one for no cut at all. The Fed stated that given available data the amount of economic uncertainty is still elevated. One concern is the risk of unemployment, although inflation does remain above the target of 2 percent and has started to rise.

Michigan Farm Bureau helps to provide venison to the hungry

LANSING, Mich. - Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB) is more actively involved this year in helping to feed the hungry with venison from deer donated by hunters. A \$15,000 check from MFB's Venison Donation Task Force was recently presented to Michigan Sportsmen Against Hunger (MSAH) to cover the processing costs of deer contributed by hunters to the cause.

The contribution was the largest monetary donation yet by the task force, which formed in April. The mission of the task force includes reducing the deer population while addressing food insecurity especially among children. An overpopulation of deer in the state has resulted in more farmers reporting crop losses from

the animals eating in their fields.

"This is a win-win for all parties involved," said Andrew Vermeesch, MFB director of public policy.

The donated deer will be ground into burger and distributed to charities across the state. "There are a lot of food banks and food pantries, but the one thing that they had the most difficulty in supplying is protein, and we can make it possible for them to get good quality venison, which is nutritious, tasty, and people love it," said MSAH President C.J. Merriman.

Since 1991, MSAH has donated more than 1.2 million pounds of ground venison to more than five million residents of the state. To donate, hunters must legally harvest and tag their deer, report the kill, field-dress it, then drop it off at a participating processor at no cost.

Hunters can also contribute money to the program when they purchase their hunting licenses. Currently, there are close to 30 processors taking part in the MSAH program.

According to MSAH, donations of deer from the organization have rispounds of venison during the 2014-15 hunting season to nearly 115,000 pounds in 2023-24.

The MFB task force previously made a \$10,000 donation to Hunters Feeding Michigan and allocated another \$60,000 to fund other venison donation events sponsored by farm bureau branches in a handful of Michigan counties.

"Efforts like this help take deer out of fields and onto the family table," Vermeesch said.

According to Hunters Feeding Michigan - a state program with a network of processors and food banks to get venison to people in need - one average-sized deer provides an estimated 160 high protein, nutritious meals.

A growing number of farmers reporting crop losses from hungry deer resulted in the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) and the Michigan Natural Resources Commission taking action in the spring to try to reduce the overpopulation.

Crop protection permits to kill fe-

en sharply from just over 18,000 male deer are now valid during entire growing season instead of just one or two week intervals. In addition, permits can be applied for before spring planting and then activated once the crop is in the ground.

Crop protection permits for killing deer were also expanded to include alfalfa, winter wheat and, in some cases, overwintered cover crops.

Farmers can also have family members, friends or anyone else wanting to take part join them in hunts to protect their crops. Previously, farmers were restricted to choosing from a state-designated list of shooters they could invite to take part in hunts.

According to MDNR, there are an estimated two million deer in the state with about half of them in southern Michigan where the numbers have exploded from about 200,000 over the past 40 years.

Adding to the overpopulation problem is the number of licensed deer hunters in Michigan has dropped from over 870,000 in 1995 to just under 600,000 in 2023, DNR said.

"The owner kept telling me it was for sale," Thelander's mom Michelle said about the inn.

Eventually, the Thelander family moved from California to Kentucky and down the road, Michelle and Shannon began running it together. While she is no longer training horses, Shannon has two horses (Hippo and Jess), and two pet pigs, Mr. Pig, and Meatball, that greet visitors that come and eat leftover breakfast waffles. The pigs are a big attraction and delight the guests.

The program's a hit - this past year, 193 students applied for just 12 spots. Some interns arrive through word of mouth, others via partnerships with local organizations like Catalyst Life Services, which helps youth ages 14-18 gain workplace experience. Interns get more than just farming: they're trained in job basics (from how to call off work to what to wear in the fields), paid a fair wage, and encouraged to explore what aspects of farming excite them most. If they discover that market vegetables and chickens aren't their thing, Garnsev helps them find placements at other farms - sometimes in dairy or horse operations.

The internship typically lasts the summer, but flexibility is key. "If a student realizes after a few weeks that it's not for them, that's okay. We want this to be a positive learning experience, not a chore," she said.

Brokaw Farm & Market produces a variety of annual and perennial crops, including orchard fruits, ber-

ries, salad greens, tomatoes, peppers, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, kohlrabi, and edible flowers. "We started out trying to replace the grocery store and grew a bit of everything," Garnsey said. Now, they adjust each season to what interns want to learn and what the community needs. "Local markets have plenty of bakers and flower growers, but not enough fruits and vegetables - that's where we focus," she said.

Eventually, Garnsey would like to make the farm completely sustainable and regenerative. "We want to eventually get to the point where we don't bring in any off-farm inputs," she said. Examples include egg-laying chickens providing not just eggs but essential fertilizer for their compost, growing bamboo to serve as eventual trellising materials, and different types of plants that could be used as attachments. "We're eventually trying to get it to where it's all very old-fashioned, all the inputs come from the farm, and there's no off-farm inputs we're not there yet, but we're working toward it," she said.

After primarily selling produce at farmers markets and off their front porch, the farm now boasts a dedicated store. "I cleared out my yard shed and we dragged it around to the front of the property and refinished the inside, added air conditioning, heat, and a refrigerator," she said. "It's a


big step up from selling off the porch."


Sales in the store and at farmers markets feature fresh produce from Brokaw Farm as well as products made by local farmers. "We want to create a network, so farmers don't feel isolated," Garnsey said. Interns get exposure to other farm operations through volunteer days, and Brokaw Farm's store sells products from these partner farms, taking only a small commission to help cover intern wages.

"One farmer invited us to their corn festival this year, and we sold our products there," she said. "One of them does honey, so we sell their honey at our farm store. One of them makes jams and jellies, so we sell their jams and jellies at our farm store and farmers markets. We're really trying to connect farmers in the area so they don't feel so isolated."

Another partnership emerged with a local Amish woman who owns her own FDA-inspected, licensed commercial cannery. "We partnered with her last year and sent some extra crops there and had her can them," Garnsey said. "Then we had those available to sell at our farmers' markets."

Currently, the Brokaw Farm & Market store is open Saturdays and Sundays, 9 am - 6 pm. Porch pick up and private shopping appointments are also available upon request.





TireGrabber makes handling of large agricultural tires safer, faster

BOONE, Iowa - At Iowa State University (ISU)'s Agricultural Engineering and Agronomy (AEA) Farm, employees like AEA Farm Manager Nathan Meyers change up to 30 large agricultural tires in a year, which is why the farm's newest addition helps minimize safety risks and maximize efficiency.

The TireGrabber, a patented tire handler that easily attaches to the front of the farm's skid loader, holds the tire securely and safely, while farm employees remove or tighten the bolts. The tool is engineered to securely grip, lift and manipulate large-scale tires from 3,000 to 12,000 pounds, according to company officials at TireGrabber, Ltd., based in Camrose, Alberta, Canada.

Meyers said what once could take several farm workers, a forklift and an extensive amount of time to ease the tire off and put a new one on, now only takes two farm workers and about five minutes.

"We can more safely handle the tires, which is important because we move a lot of tires due to research projects going on," he said. "We also have equipment coming here to the farm and we are shipping equipment out, so we're constantly changing tires."

Canadian farmer Darcy Goossen, the tool's creator and TireGrabber president, and Steven Minken, TireGrabber senior business development manager, were inspired to partner with ISU after meeting Meyers at the recent Farm Progress trade show.

During an ISU campus visit, Goos-

sen and Minken decided to lease the TireGrabber and a sprayer jack to the university at no cost to support agricultural safety education.

"Steven and I decided we wanted to start actually donating to causes where we could see the impact and plant seeds of safety for future generations," Goossen said. "The Tire-Grabber is user-friendly and perfect for a university setting. Anyone can learn how to use it; it's very self-explanatory."

Kendall Lamkey, ISU professor of

agronomy, and associate dean for facilities and operations for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, said tools like the TireGrabber help ensure the university is a place that promotes safety and models safe behaviors to students.

"My top priority is to ensure the safety of all my employees," he said. "I want to send them home the same way they came to work. I consider the TireGrabber a huge addition to keeping our faculty, staff and students safe, both here on campus and our facilities around the state."

Meyers told Farm World the feedback about the TireGrabber has been very good: "The farm staff have enjoyed using the TireGrabber equipment because it makes a tough and dangerous job of changing and moving large agricultural tires into a safe and easier task."

He said if the lease on the Tire-Grabber ended, "we would look into purchasing the TireGrabber. Safetv is a big concern in agriculture and at Iowa State University, and this tool makes a dangerous job safer."

He said the TireGrabber is a win for everyone and expects its use to extend beyond just the AEA Farm: "We want everyone to be safe, so when we aren't using it, our other farms are welcome to borrow it."

The daily rhythm of goat milking for the last 36 years

ADAMS County, Ind. - Roger and Jenny Neuenschwander, along with their extended family, have been raising, showing, breeding, and milking goats for 36 years.

They are well-known dairy goat breeders, particularly recognized for their Toggenburg (Toggs) and Nubian goats. Toggs are the oldest registered breed in the American Dairy Goat Association (ADGA). They are primarily known for their high milk production, extended lactation period, consistent performance, and gentle nature. The Nubians are known for their long, floppy ears and high-quality, rich milk with high butterfat content. They are a dual-purpose breed for both dairy and meat production.

The Neuenschwanders utilize an eight-stanchion milking area where two goats can be milked at a time using an automatic milking machine twice daily; very similar to dairy cattle on a smaller scale. Each goat will produce around one gallon of milk per day. Goat milk is the most widely consumed milk in the world. It has a rich nutritional profile, is easier to digest, and is a viable alternative to cow's milk for those allergic.

Jenny said, "We started out raising registered Holstein dairy cattle. When 4-H fair time came around, the kids were more interested in the goat barn." The family maintains a 40-goat herd. They keep their own bucks to breed their does and sell breeding stock and wethers (male goat that has been castrated). Participating as a



family unit, a handful of goats are entered in annual competitions from the county and state 4-H fairs to the national level.

The Neuenschwander team returned from the July 2025 American Dairy Goat Association (ADGA) National Show held in Grand Island, Neb., to bring home the title of National Show Toggenburg Senior Champion with their 4-year old, "Neuen-View Mt Amazing Grace." Judges look for an attractive framework, strong level top line, correct feet and legs, and wide, flat

The family plans to participate in the 15-day 2025 North American International Livestock Exposition (NAILE), in Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6-20. This is considered the largest all-breed, purebred livestock show



Corn husking a daily childhood chore on farm for champion

HUDSON, Ind. - A northern Indiana man credits his Amish upbringing on a dairy farm for recently winning the state and national titles in corn husking along with his prior top finishes in the competitions.

Kevin Lambright, 46, of Hudson, was also the state and national corn husking champion in 2023.

He started competing in 2020, nearly 30 years since Lambright husked his last ear of corn before leaving the family farm near Topeka. One of his chores while growing up was husking corn before and after school to provide feed for his family's 30 or so dairy cows.

He also helped milk the cows, which everyone in his family did manually. "It made for strong hands," he said.

Lambright won the national competition on Oct. 18 for the second time at Reed Farms in Nappanee by husking a whopping 475 pounds of corn in 30 minutes. With deductions for cobs not perfectly stripped, his net total was still just over 458 pounds.

Lambright said he was surprised by the amount, which was his personal best.

"Sometimes, everything goes your mer competitive corn husker. way when you're husking. You don't drop any. You don't get tired. I just literally had a great day," he said.

In comparison, he won the state title on Oct. 4, also at Reed Farms, with just over 361 pounds of corn husked in 20 minutes.

Lambright was also the 2024 state champion corn husker, but he did not compete that year in the national competition in Iowa due to a conflict with his job at Cedar Creek RV, a maker of recreational vehicles in

"I chose to work, instead," he said. Currently, he's an assistant plant manager with the company he's been with for 26 years.

During harvest, Lambright said he husked corn every morning from daybreak until jumping in the shower and heading off to school. Husking corn is what he did after school, too, along with his other chores like milking and feeding the cows until dark.

He also fed the dozen or so draft horses his family used to pull plows during spring planting and wagons to bring in the crops in the fall.

"I think what helps me is I done it for that long while growing up," he

Lambright said his younger brother, Atlee, was competitive at husking corn when he was approached by a man looking for entries in the contests he staged.

"He wanted us to compete. I decided I'll go give it a shot," he said.

Lambright said he competed against his brother that year and lost. He also wasn't a top finisher in the state and national contests but placed second the next two years at the national level.

Lambright said Atlee hasn't competed in about five years but likes to joke that he would beat him again if he ever got back into it.

He also likes to poke fun at his older brother, Duane, who's also a for-

"I always tell them they're afraid to get back in because they know I'm going to beat them," he said.

Like he did as a kid, Lambright wears a galvanized steel hook on his right hand to slice the skin over each cob before peeling it off and throwing the stripped cob into a wagon.

His secrets to success include keeping his hands close together while tossing each finished cob into the wagon next to him.

"If you stretch your arm all the way out to make a throw and then all the

way back that takes up a lot of time," he said.

He said knowing where the next ear is before reaching to rip it off the stalk is another time saver.

Lambright said he doesn't know how much longer he'll keep competing but would like to pass down the tradition to his children, ages 7 and 5, who he took to competitions the past two years.

"I would like to get them started,"





Wholesome Meadows Farm's owners focus on chickens, cattle, hogs

BLUFFTON, Ind. - Although neither Sara nor Josh Smith grew up on a farm - Sam was actually a city kid – they liked the farming lifestyle. So, in the spring of 2014, they got some land, started farming, and never looked back. They call the farm Wholesome Meadows.

Now they farm about 130 acres that they own and rent. Their main focus is on livestock. They have 1,100-1,200 laying hens and raise around 2,000-3,000 broiler chickens every year. They finish a dozen beef cattle and 25 to 30 hogs a year.

"We also raise a couple acres of pumpkins, around a half-acre of produce, and 90 acres of non-GMO grain, corn, soybeans and wheat," Josh said.

When they wanted to add more row crops, they found a farm close to their home farm that would have allowed them to expand. So they went to Iroquois Valley, an organic, regenerative farmland finance company that provides farmer-friendly leases.

"They purchased that farm for us, and they are letting us rent it from them," Josh said. "They have very good terms and a long-term contract. so we have that security. In the future, we have the option to purchase the property. It has helped us be able to expand without having the resources to purchase this farm on our own at this time."

They are transitioning to organic on

the home farm and the rental property and should be certified next year.

Sara added that they have always farmed organically; they just weren't certified.

'That's what we feed our family, so we want the food that we sell to be food that we would feed our family," she said.

Their kids, Isaac, age 9, Sadie, 8, and Cora, 5, help with farm chores.

"We started paying them a little bit so that definitely helps with the motivation," Sara said. "We are teaching them, okay, how do you handle the money that you are making? And now that you're getting paid, here are some requirements that need to be met. We

are kind of preparing them for when they get older and get a job, they will already know the expectations."

They can definitely help with the eggs, probably the farm's biggest

seller. Those layers produce about 500 dozen eggs a week. That's a lot of eggs to wash.

"We get compliments from our customers that our eggs are the best they've ever had," Josh said. "We get a lot of word-of-mouth advertisement that way."

They market their products at the Fort Wayne Farmers Market, at their farm, and online through an organization called Market Wagon.

"They have a hub in Indianapolis and Fort Wayne," Sara said. "The customers go to their website and they order our products and every Thursday we go to those two hubs and drop off everything they ordered. Then they have drivers who deliver the bags to the customers. We just pay them a percentage and they do all of the work for us."

That's just one way that the family builds a little more freedom and flexibility into their schedule, and that freedom and flexibility is one thing they like about the farming lifestyle.

"That, and being able to work with your family," Josh said. "We love being outside, the fresh air, the sunshine, the dirt."

Sara added that since they homeschool, Josh can sometimes be there for part of the school day.

The downside of farming is that with livestock, even on Christmas Day, there are chores, and they never get to take a vacation. Yet they have no regrets about their choice to farm.

"We were looking for a better way of life for our family and a good environment for our children to teach them the value of hard work," Josh said. "We were also looking for a career change, a way to earn money working at home with the family. We are blessed to both be full-time on the farm. I do a little bit of contracting work in the off-season, but we could wholly survive on the farm."

Weak La Niña possible in December

The 8-to-14-day outlook (for Nov. 12-18) from the National Weather Service Climate Predication Center for our area of the Midwest calls for likely above normal temperatures and leaning above normal precipitation. Eric Snodgrass, of Nutrien Ag Solutions, thinks our colder temperature now is being influenced by a big low-pressure system over the Canadian Hudson Bay region. However, the trend through November will be milder and possibly wetter. Some computer models for December show a weak La Niña, with colder and wetter weather possible.

2025 Soybean Variety Trial results from The Ohio State University are now available. The northwest Ohio trials were in Henry and Sandusky counties and were planted May 27 and 30 and harvested Oct. 11 and 13, respectively. Henry County had 60 soybean varieties ranging from 2.3 to 3.1 relative maturity and yields ranging from 80.6 to 61.5 bushels per acre, with a mean (average) yield of 74 bushels. Results are available at the OSU Soybean and Small Grain Agronomy website: www.stepupsoy. osu.edu.

The official Michigan State University 2025 soybean variety trial results are not yet published, as they are compiled and distributed in a report for winter meetings, typically in late 2025 or early 2026. The final 2025 Michigan Soybean Performance Report will be published through the

Wheat germination and emergence may be slower than normal due to dry soil conditions, as rainfall has been very scattered and light. Late germination and emergence mimics late planting, which historically results in lower final yields. Wheat germinating by the third week of October will limit tillering, overwintering hardiness and may result in a possible 10 to 25 percent lower yield than wheat planted by the Hessian fly free date of late September. Farmers may wish to assess stands in late winter or very early spring before deciding whether to keep the stand. Good fall stands should still have some nitrogen (up to 20 pounds of actual nitrogen) applied as soon as possible.

Turkey trivia: Wild turkeys are native to Mexico, taken to Europe to be domesticated, then later brought back to North America by English colonists. The average person eats about 15 pounds of turkey per year. A male turkey is called a tom; a female is a hen. There is no butter in a Butterball® turkey.







Kentucky pasture-raised Heritage turkeys are nationally known

GEORGETOWN, KY – From Elmwood Stock Farm in Scott County, Ky., to families in more than 40 states, roughly 500 unique Heritage-bred turkeys are shipped off to dinner tables each Thanksgiving.

Farm owner Mac Stone said they may look like regular turkeys, but these birds are set apart from the flock. Stone said it's their background and the way they're raised.

"They're sleeker, they're smarter, they communicate with each other, they have this communal brain," Stone said. "They still have that natural instinct like their wild cousins, but they're domesticated to where they stay here and we can feed them and take care of them. The Broad-Breasted Bronze turkeys have full, plump white team breasts many of us are accustomed to. These look like the turkeys you find at the grocery store, but the similarities stop there. The Heritage turkeys are barely domesticated cousins of the wild turkeys you see along back roads and hiking trails. These have a more equal white-to-dark meat ration, and the meat overall has a deeper, richer flavor and texture."

Elmwood Stock Farm is a sixth-generation family farm situated on nearly 400 acres just outside Georgetown. A USDA-certified organic operation, Elmwood Stock Farm produces vegetables, fruits, pantry items, pasture-raised poultry and pork, and grass-fed, grass-finished beef and lamb for direct sales to customers through the CSA Farm Share and online store, as well as for wholesale and restaurant accounts. When Thanks-

giving rolls around, the farm is best known for its Heritage-bred turkeys.

Elmwood Stock Farm is one of a few farms in the country growing organic, Heritage-breed turkeys. Elmwood's Heritage turkeys are not of one particular breed, but made up of a group of breeds. They include Narragansetts, the oldest-known American breed, Slate turkeys, and a few Bourbon Reds, named after neighboring Bourbon County.

For around two decades, Elmwood has raised the Heritage turkeys to prevent the birds' extinction. But they're not the only turkeys at the farm. Elmwood also raises Broad-Breasted turkeys.

Whichever bird a customer chooses at Elmwood, the price is much higher than what they'd pay at the supermarket – up to \$299. Stone says it's worth it.

"Yeah, they're paying a lot of money, but they know where it's going, they

know they're gonna keep this land farming longer, and again the taste is the total difference," Stone said.

According to Stone, some characteristics that distinguish the very rare Heritage turkey from the standard Broad-Breasted variety are slower growth, more proportionate breasts to legs, and the ability to naturally breed.

Elmwood's turkeys have become so popular, especially the 15- to 22-pound Broad-Breasted Bronze birds, that they sell out weeks in advance of Thanksgiving.

"If you want a big turkey, you have to order early," Stone said.

The Elmwood turkeys' diets consist of grass and bugs, supplemented by organic feed.

"We move the turkeys around the pasture so they're always on fresh grass," Stone said. "We give them feed from organic grain farmers in western Kentucky."

That organic composition includes a mix of corn and soybeans, roasted so fat remains in the beans.

"It helps impart a nice flavor to the

bird, which is why ours don't taste gamy like wild turkeys," Stone said. "The unique flavor leads to a lot of repeat customers."

"About 15 years ago, we were asked by the Livestock Conservancy to help preserve these Heritage breeds," Stone said. "I told them we're not in the zoo business, but if you can eat them, we'll raise them. It's been fun. They have more personality than Broad Breasted birds."

Unlike the lumbering Bronzes, the Heritage breeds can fly.

"It took a few years to learn to get an animal that flies into a cattle trailer," Stone said, noting he uses netting to contain the birds when loading them.

Elmwood's Heritage breed turkeys were "recommended" in a taste test by Cook's Illustrated. It was the only organic turkey to receive such a distinction from the national magazine, which described the flavor as "rich without gamy notes" with a "texture like velvet."

Vogue Magazine called Elmwood the "best place to order Heritage turkeys." The Spruce Eats, an online food site, listed Elmwood among the nation's 11 best mail-order turkeys, naming its Broad-Breasted Bronze variety the Best for Large Gatherings.

"The Heritage turkey hens laid their eggs, and we hatched them in the incubator back in the springtime," Stone said. "They've been living on our rolling pastures since coming out of the brooder barn at a few weeks of age. This represents the essence of farming optimism: turn an egg into the centerpiece of the Thanksgiving feast, and have some fun while doing it."

Farmiing And Gardening

Falling leaves let you know that it is time for fertilizing the pasture and garden. Manure and compost that is spread now will have a chance to work its way into the ground all winter.

Order legume seed for winter pastures. Start all your bedding plants under lights at new moon to get a head start on spring.

Schedule your frost seeding for January and February. Deep water all perennials before the ground freezes, especially if your garden suffered from the drought this summer.

The Natural Calendar

Rhe final rites of fall include a chronology of the last leaves and fruits. Major losses occur on beeches and pears as autumn ends. Sometimes oaks are the holdouts, sometimes forsythia or a hardy honeysuckle. Sometimes sweet gums and poplars keep a few leaves this late in the year; sometimes protected oak-leaf hydrangeas, Osage, mock trees and shrubs.

The fruit of the bittersweet continues to fall to the undergrowth. Pale witch hazel flowers are shriveling. Privets are bare, their blue berries revealed. Euonymus fruits are losing their white outer shells, orange cores unveiled by the cold.

New England aster and stonecrop foliage turned yellow in early November; now the plants are shedding. Late garden lettuce and the autumn growth of rhubarb have withered. Hosta leaves have collapsed into the remnants of maples, ginkgoes and white mulberries. The gooseneck turns chocolate brown. Most all the seeds are gone from milkweed pods; just a few wisps of down cling to their shells. Fragile pokeweed stems have exploded in the frost. The last roses have been frozen by nights in the teens.

The third week of November is Skunk Cabbage Budding Season, a season of the wetlands that lasts until Skunk Cabbage Blooming Season in February. Now Winter Wheat Greening Season greens the fields as Bluebird Migrating Season and Cricketsong Season close. Throughout town, Silver Maple Leafdrop Season foretells next week's Beech Leafdrop Season. At bird feeders, Junco Season adds juncos to the sparrows and cardinals. On the high wires Sparrow Hawk Season arrives. Bittersweet Fruit Dropping Season comes to the bittersweet vines, and Decorative Pear Leafturn Season transforms Xenia Avenue.

In the greenhouse, it is Aloe Flowering Season. Along the West Coast,

orange or lilacs outlast all the other this week is the annual Crab Harvest Season. Poinsettia Season begins in Yellow Springs in Ohio as Crawdad Season starts in Louisiana, crawdads moving into flooded rice fields to feed on the remnants of that crop.

John Deere 835R Gator snapped up \$24,000 at Ohio auction

New Bavaria, OH – Siefker Real Estate & Auctions had an online sale on Oct. 7 featuring compact John Deere equipment, shop tools and other farm-related items. The machinery had been meticulously maintained by Bill Helberg, a longtime local farm equipment repairman who was downsizing his collection. The auction included 187 lots offered via Proxibid. com, with a preview available on Oct. 4. Payments were accepted by cash, check or money order.

Of particular draw were six Deere compact machines. Grabbing the event's top sum of \$24,000 was a one-owner 2024 John Deere 835R Gator with only 100 hours, lightly used for cruising. The super-clean 4WD unit featured a full cab with power steering, heat and AC, and radio. It was fitted with tight doors and glass, and custom wood sideboards.

A bid of about half of that -\$13,250 - took second place, for a good-condition JD 4WD 1025R diesel tractor with only 198 hours. The ready-to-work machine was outfitted with hydrostatic, a 120R loader, a custom boom, a fork-ready bucket, plus an auto-connect 60D mower. A near-new JD 1023E diesel subcompact utility tractor drew \$10,750. It featured a factory cab, hydro drive, a custom rear blade, and a 47-inch quick-hitch snowblower with a rolling cart. Practically untouched, with only 11.3 hours, the owner joked, "It just didn't snow much!"

Winning bids dropped noticeably from there, with a finely maintained 2024 Deere Z530M zero-turn mower with just 77 hours landing at \$3,200. It was equipped with a 48-inch Accel deep deck, Kawasaki v-twin engine, hydro-drive, custom step assist, chute and rollbar. A well-kept JD X590 followed at \$3,100. Showing only 179 hours, it was the owner's main mower and came equipped with a 48-inch Accel Deep deck, Kawasaki V-twin, power steering, hydro drive, heavy-duty frame, and chute. Bidding hit \$2,200 for a 1988 John Deere 332 diesel garden tractor, showing 1,718 hours. In exceptional shape for its age, and a true workhorse, it offered a 50-inch deck, three-point hitch, and front snow blower.

Deere and other brands of implements were also offered, including a Deere garden disk – originally used on the JD 332 (above) – going to a new home for \$110. A Deere garden cultivator, also used on the 332, went for \$60, while a Brinly cultivator was grabbed for \$55.

Equally prominent at this sale was the selection of shop equipment. It was led by a well-cared-for Enco 110-1351 lathe – stored under a blanket when not in use – with a 13-by-40 gear head, cabinet, chucks, live centers, and accessories, all going for \$3,100. An Enco ZX-40 milling machine, with additional face mills, chucks, boring heads, cabinet, work lamp, transformer box, and power feeder, sold for \$950. Later, a Crafts-





Some USDA reports released as government shutdown continues

Frustration continues in our nation's capital and around the country as the government shutdown remained in place this week, even impacting airline flights. It was announced that food aid for the 42 million Americans dependent on the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) would be partially funded after MIELKE MARKET two judges ruled that USDA contingency funds must be By Lee Mielke used. President Donald Trump however stated on Truth Social

that the SNAP benefits "will be given only when the Radical Left Democrats open up the government and not before." The Senate returned to Washington on Monday but did not schedule another vote on the issue as we reached what has become the longest shutdown ever.

The USDA said it will publish a few of its regular reports, despite the shutdown. The September Milk Production report will be issued Nov. 10, and the Crop Production and World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates will be released Nov. 14. The Dairy Products report, which would have been issued this week was not.

The U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments this week regarding the legality of Trump's tariffs. The case is being closely watched and could have huge implications for global trade and U.S. policy. Meanwhile, trade talks with Canada have not been rescheduled since the furor over a Canadian financed TV ad campaign prompted Trump to end the talks. Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney apologized for the campaign.

The USDA announced the October Federal order Class III milk price at \$16.91 per hundredweight, down 68 cents from September, \$5.94 below October 2024, and the lowest Class III price since April 2024. That put the 10-month Class III average at \$18.31, down from \$18.82 a year ago, and compares to \$17.10 in 2023.

Wednesday's Class III futures settlements had the November price at \$17.09; December, \$17.02; January, \$16.53; February, \$16.50; and March at \$16.62.

The October Class IV price is \$14.30, down \$1.87 from September, \$6.60 below a year ago, and the lowest Class IV since March 2021. Its 10-month average stands at \$18.11, down from \$20.71 a year ago and compares to \$18.93 in 2023.

"Dairy margins were flat to weaker over the last half of October as higher milk prices and an increase in the feed markets were largely offsetting," says the latest Margin Watch (MW) from Chicago-based Commodity and Ingredient Hedging LLC.

While the milk market was higher, this was only in Class 3 futures while ongoing weakness in butter caused Class 4 to sell off. Butter prices have reached a four-year low with the spot CME market dropping to \$1.545 per pound to reach the lowest price since early 2021.

"Increased butterfat in milk tests combined with rising global milk output has depressed butter prices both in the U.S. and other markets and U.S. producer milk checks in most federal orders," the MW stated. "The Class 3 market caught a bid though as several U.S. cheese plants experienced production issues recently that reduced cheese production during October.

"Both mozzarella and Cheddar barrel production was well below expected output due to unplanned disruptions for maintenance and compliance. USDA's Dairy Market News mentioned downtime in each of its last five weekly reports during October, also noting that spot Cheddar barrel inventories were 'somewhat tight."

Rabobank's latest dairy report looked at consumer trends, animal protein, and dairy production. It stated, "Food inflation continues to outpace overall inflation, and restaurants are feeling the pressure, with nine straight quarters of declining traffic." Speaking in the Nov. 10 Dairy Radio now broadcast, Rabobank senior dairy analyst

Lucas Fuess said there continues to be signs of stress by consumers at retail as well as restaurants, though some are doing well.

Grocery store sales in key

dairy products are still tending higher, according to Fuess, as dairy is an affordable form of protein, especially when compared to other protein sources. U.S. beef prices are at multi-year highs, he said, due to the U.S. herd being at the lowest level in decades, a result of higher feed costs and draught the past few years. The USDA's all-fresh beef price reached a record \$9.18 per pound in August, according to Rabobank, and U.S. cattle slaughter from January through September was down 1.5 million head, or 7 percent from a year ago.

"Pork prices also remain well ahead of year-ago levels and the five-year average, with cutout values of \$109 per cwt. are averaging 15 percent above last year. Chicken production continues to outpace year-ago levels, and prices are down sharply in recent weeks, with boneless breast meat prices now 27 percent below year-ago levels.

"Crop producers are also under pressure," says Rabobank. "Corn stakeholders are pushing for year-round use to boost ethanol demand, while soybean surpluses are increasing reliance on proposed biodiesel mandates to absorb excess supply.

"August milk production increased 3.2 percent versus the prior year, and at 9.52 million cows, the herd size is now the largest since the mid-1990s. July total dairy exports were up 7 percent year over year, and cheese is on track for a record year," says Rabobank. We'll get September data next week.

Cash block Cheddar dropped 10.25 cents Monday and 1.75 cents Tuesday, dipping to \$1.6475 per pound, lowest CME price since September 26, but it closed Thursday morning at \$1.66. It finished Friday at \$1.7675 and a year ago at \$1.72. The barrels fell to \$1.70 Tuesday, lowest since Sept. 30, and were holding there Thursday, after closing Friday at \$1.8050 and \$1.7675 a year ago.

HighGround Dairy's "Monday Morning Huddle" warned: "Given the heavy milk volumes and new cheese capacity, it seems unlikely that the (previous) price increases were due to supply constraints, other than the seasonal troughs in milk production in October and November. Cheese prices tend to increase in third and fourth quarter due to increased demand from the holidays and football season.

"Prices could maintain these levels a bit longer, but the team at HighGround expects declines at the tail end of 2025 into early 2026, as demand wanes and the Northern Hemisphere flush kicks

StoneX says. "Fresh Cheddar was likely in good demand short term as some final holiday buying and exports were getting booked but that has since waned. Markets expected that demand to pull back and continue to be weighed down by strong milk production expectations."

Central region cheesemakers told Dairy Market News that retail and food

service sales are steady, but some note lighter demand compared to a year ago. Milk production is steady, but some cheesemakers say strong demand from Class I processors was reducing spot availability. Some cheesemakers were still down for maintenance and were selling spot milk to nearby processors. Demand for Class III milk was somewhat light as cheesemakers have sufficient volumes internally. Class III prices ranged from \$2-under to \$1.50-over Class at mid-week.

Western Cheese manufacturers are receiving contractual volumes of milk and spot loads are available. Unplanned production downtime and a few plants yet to run at full capacity contributed to the week's situation. Cheese production varies from lighter to steady. Domestic demand is reported as steady, but not robust. Sellers generally convey sentiment that the approaching November holiday will strengthen demand for cheese over the next few weeks.

Make decisions based on facts, what's best for your operation

With harvest nearing the end, we received good news with grain prices going up recently and followed up with a trade deal with China buying soybeans again. I had a Vo-Ag teacher in high school who told us to act on facts rather than be moved by headlines and emotion.

In an earlier article I suggested holding on to beans by renting bins rather than selling at sub \$10 a bushel. This wasn't because I had any inside information or crystal ball, it is because the facts led me to believe that the market would have to react positively when China came back into the market. China must buy beans to meet its population's needs.

I suggest that corn will follow as ethanal demands increase. This brings me to the topic I want us to think about. There is growing coverage of upcoming changes in agriculture. All the evidence points in that direction. Since the 1980s, we haven't seen the stage set for such significant changes

in the way farms, both livestock and cereals, are run. If we aren't very careful, the family farm will be a thing of the past.

Many times, I have pondered whether we should have continued the Granges or Co-ops in the traditional sense. Where we would pull together for the common good. It's my suggestion that we need a way to hold our suppliers and the buyers of our commodities accountable. While our suppliers continue to hold firm the percentage of their business margins, generating larger profits than ever before, we continue to bear the weight of the entire house of cards.

A for-instance is how equipment dealerships are encouraged by their respective manufacturers to pay all of the dealership expenses including labor from parts sales and this assures them that new/used sales, service and warranty are profitable, even when we're underwater. That's why a \$26 bearing is \$186, and windshield wipers are \$150. That said, we're seeing staff reductions at the dealerships because our well has run dry. We are looking at all other options for parts, working to make our equipment last longer and yet it's not enough.

In agriculture, we often don't feel the full effects of losses until the next year or maybe the second. I am told that it takes three years of profitable farming to make up for one year of losses at the level we experienced last year and even this year. Even adjusting loans for interest only still leaves an unpaid principal balance in addition to the next years. So, we're now seeing generational farms forced to recognize that their equity will no longer absorb losses.


What are our options? The first thing I believe to be essential is that we reason for ourselves. We look at the facts and stop, yes STOP, listening to the headlines and make our decisions solely on the facts and what's best for our operations. I further suggest that we will find that the majority of the 1.8 million farmers and ranchers left in this country share a common goal, to protect a way of life that this country is founded on. Work ethic, morals and integrity in everything we do.

Finding the perfect dredge to cook fish in wasn't easy

Many years ago, I became frustrated with the choices of "Professional Dredges" on the market. It seemed everything I bought was overpriced, over spiced, too strong or too coarse. Facing only discouragement in the supermarket aisles, I rolled up my sleeves and began to tinker with creating a homemade dredge suiting my cooking desires. SPAULDING OUTDOORS

wanted something By Jack Spaulding which coated well, wasn't too coarse, gave some crispiness and wasn't over spiced. After a lot of trial and error, I came up with a dredge with low-cost ingredients readily available in the local supermarket. It took a lot of frying fish, chicken and seafood to get there, but I finally compiled a recipe suiting all my needs.

I combine in thirds – one pound each of enriched white commeal, enriched flour and corn starch along with a small amount of garlic powder and onion powder. With the primary ingredients sold in 5-pound or 1-pound amounts, I make a little over 15 pounds of dredge at a time. It sounds like a lot, but it goes quicker than you would think.

Using a kitchen counter scale, I weigh out 1 pound of enriched white commeal, 1 pound of enriched flour and combine with a 1-pound package of cornstarch. To this I add 2 ounces (four tablespoons) of onion powder and 2 ounces (four tablespoons) of garlic powder. Using a large kitchen whisk, I mix the ingredients thoroughly and bag in plastic freezer bags. I try to fill about a quart of the dredge per bag. Stashed in the freezer, the dredge lasts for years.

The combined and mixed ingredients make an excellent "wet" or "dry" dredge.

For fried chicken, I like to liberally coat the chicken pieces in Frank's Hot Sauce and roll and well coat the chicken pieces in the custom dredge. When the chicken is fried to a golden brown in 320-degree Canola or Peanut oil, it is delicious. The hot sauce doesn't add any heat or spice but imparts a delicious layer of flavor. The Frank's beats an extended soaking in buttermilk.

For fish, I simply roll the damp pieces of fish in the dredge before frying at

For shrimp, I dip them in the dry dredge, and then dip them in a wet dredge made of the custom ingredients and beer or ginger ale. I make the wet dredge just a little runnier than pancake batter. Don't overcook... I usually fry ours about four minutes depending on the size of the shrimp.

For onion rings, I let the rings set in an ice-water bath for an hour or so; drain and partially dry them and cover them with the dry dredge. Dusting off the excess, I dip the rings into the same wet dredge I mentioned for the shrimp and fry at 320 degrees until golden brown.

As with all fried foods, salt to taste while still hot and make sure you have made plenty!

Tree news from the DNR

A swamp chestnut oak tree in Jennings County has been recognized as the largest of the species in the country by the National Champion Tree program, with a height of 95 feet, a circumference of 318 inches, and a canopy spread of 118 feet.

The record swamp chestnut oak is on the family farm owned by Richard and Kris Schepman outside of Crothersville. Recently, Gov. Mike Braun and Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) leaders presented the Schepmans with a certificate recognizing their family's stewardship of this impressive tree.

"Over the last century, Indiana's for-

ested land has substantially grown as a result of Hoosiers' conservation work and responsible stewardship," Braun said. The Schepman family and private landowners across the state deserve high praise for their commitment to growing healthy trees like this giant in Jennings County, which I hope continues to stand tall for generations of future Hoosiers to enjoy.'

The DNR Division of Forestry, which maintains a list of Indiana's largest known trees of each of the state's native species, notified the national program of the tree, and its record score of 442.5, which is the tree's height (feet), circumference (inches), and canopy spread (feet, multiplied by 0.25) added together.

According to the U.S. Forest Service, the swamp chestnut oak is native to "the Atlantic Coastal Plain from New Jersev and extreme eastern Pennsylvania, south to north Florida, and west to east Texas; it is found north in the Mississippi River Valley to extreme southeast Oklahoma, Arkansas, southeastern Missouri, southern Illinois, southern Indiana, and locally to southeast Kentucky and eastern Tennessee."

The tree is on private property, so it is not available for public viewing.



man 20-inch industrial drill press hammered at \$750.

Somewhat lower offers scored items like a 20-drawer U.S. General rolling tool cabinet that changed hands for \$475 and an air-operated shop press that struck \$400. Bidding went to \$200 for a Central Precision 7-by-10 minilathe – yet another piece stored under a blanket to preserve its condition.

5,618-acre Illinois farm sells for \$47.7 million

Illinois

Greene County - In early October, Halderman Companies, in partnership with Moore & Warner Farm Real Estate, closed the sale of 5,618 acres of Illinois farmland. The largely contiguous tract lay along the east side of the Illinois River and was levee-protected. It was located within the Hartwell and Keach drainage districts and included a large farm headquarters, center-pivot irrigation, and two grain storage facilities with over 400,000 bushels capacity. The property sold for \$47.7 million (\$8,491/acre).

Taylorville - On Oct. 5, Cory Craig auctioned 52.7 acres of recreational land zoned AG-1. The South Fork River ran through the northeast corner of the property, which also featured multiple ponds, potential homesites, abundant wildlife, and marketable mature hardwood. 
